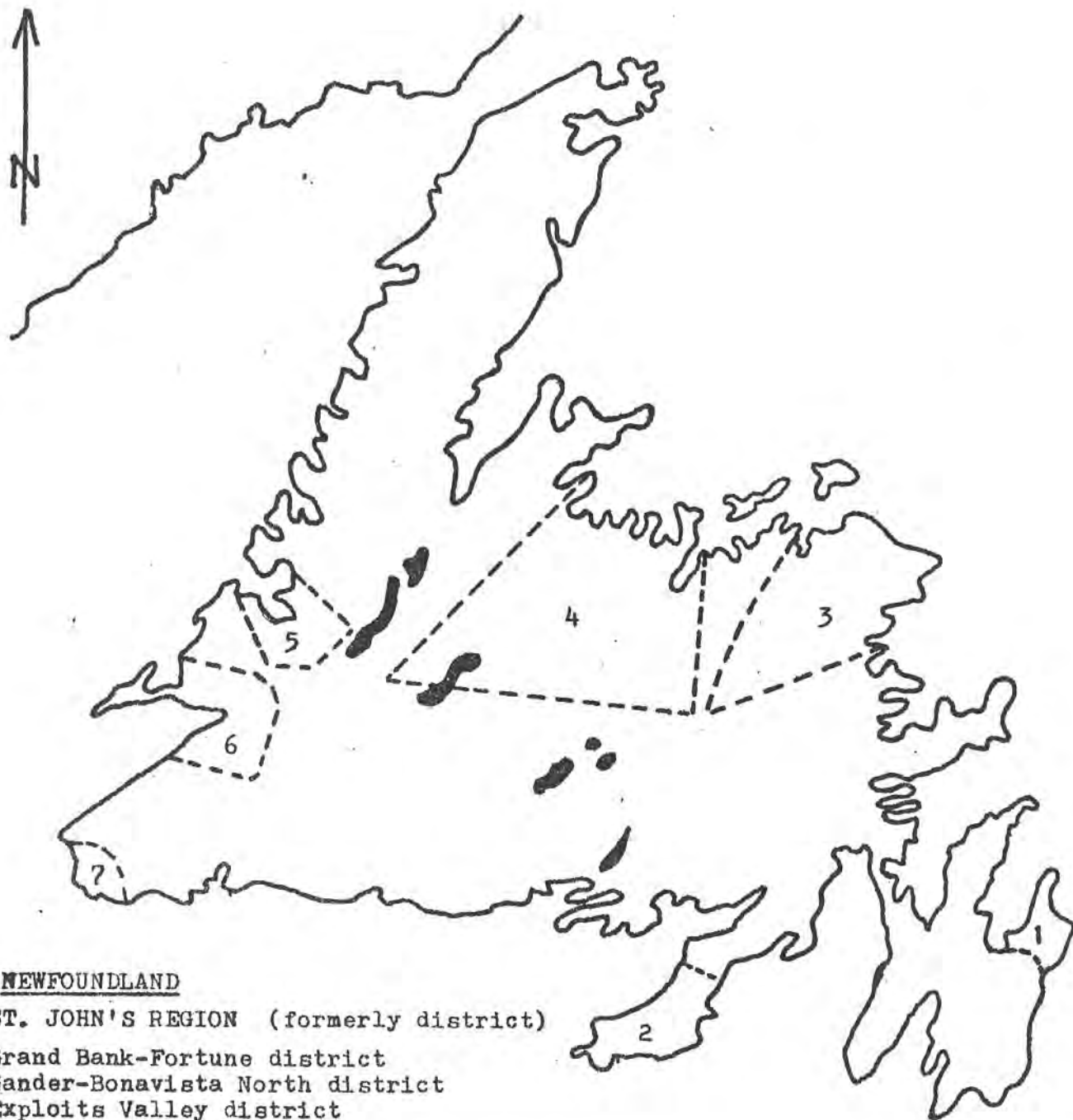

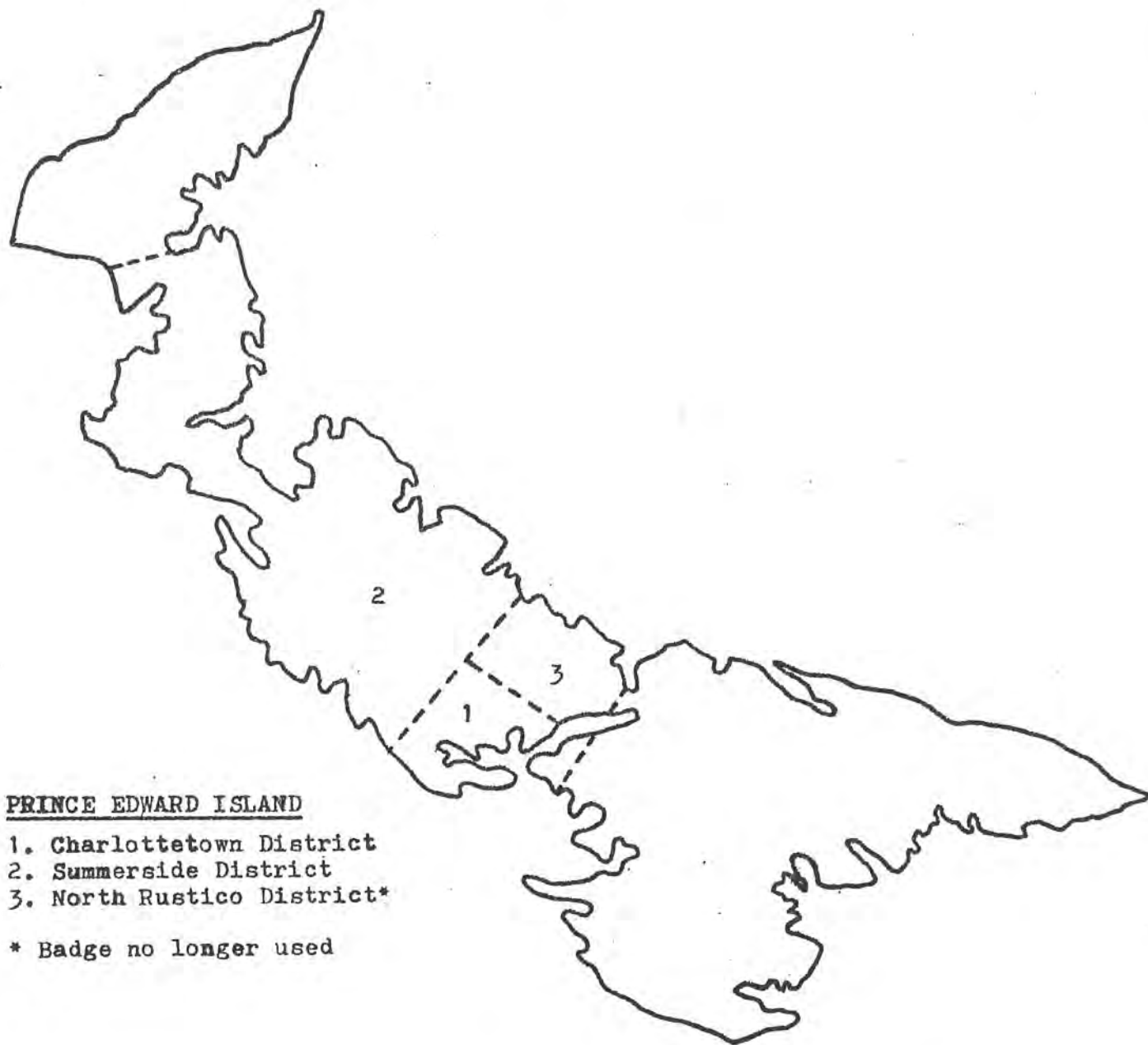

BADGE HISTORIES



The emblem of the Kitsilano, B.C. district is the Sisiutl (sis-ootle). The Sisiutl is a double-headed dragon of the Kwakiutl Indian tribe of B.C. The Khatsalahno Tribe, from which the district's name is derived is a branch of the Kwakiutls. The Sisiutl is said to be a good luck omen or a lucky charm. The use of this head on tribal feasting dishes denotes successful hunting and a state of prosperity and well being. It was the Kwakiutl Tribe who carved the giant totem pole which stands in front of National

Headquarters in Ottawa. Kitsilano District is a part of the Vancouver-Coast Region.

In the early 1950's the Tri-County, N.S. district council was formed with representatives from Milford, Shubenacadie, Musquodobit and Maitland while today the movement carries on in more than seven communities. The prefix 'Tri' is used because the Council serves the groups in Hants, Halifax and Colchester counties. The shape of the badge and the 3 trees are symbols of the counties, and also for the large pulp and paper industry. The deer head in the centre depicts the wildlife of the area and the well known Shubenacadie Wildlife Park. The river running through the badge represents the rivers which border the counties.

The centre of the South Okanagan District in B.C. depicts a peach, symbolic of the valley's main industry, with an orchard in the middle and a mountain in the background. The snow-capped peak is known as Apex Mountain; the highest point in the district, and a popular skiing area in the winter. From the peach radiate sun's rays symbolic of the warm weather the area receives. The blue background represents the lakes which the area's major centre, Penticton lies between: Okanagan Lake at one end and Skaha Lake at the other.

I'll trade ya ...

Hints For Swopping at CJ'77

One of the many enjoyable activities of a jamboree is exchanging a badge or pin with a new friend who hails from across the province, across the country, or around the world! Many boys and leaders will take the opportunity provided by CJ'77 to trade district badges to add to their campfire blankets, to remember someone who shared a great experience with them, or just for the fun of collecting. Swopping will be fun for everyone if we all keep a few simple guidelines in mind.

One of the most important things to remember is the need to plan ahead. Although swopping is a part of every jamboree, some boys are disappointed each time. Because they brought nothing to trade. Now is the time to lay in a supply of district badges; Perhaps your district could order more this spring, rather than waiting for the fall as they usually do. Don't neglect other tradeable items either; many provinces, regions, towns and cities have pins, flags, Pennants, stickers etc. available through your tourist office, Chamber of Commerce, or City Hall. Although these are usually traded for similar items, rather than district badges, they are always in demand. Camp and event crests are often traded as well but are sometimes rather expensive unless you're the guy that got stuck with the extra 87 Camporee crests this year !

Swopping at the Jamboree should take place when it won't interfere with planned program activities. As a general rule, badges are swopped on a 1:1 basis without regard for the size, number of colours, or place of origin. There are, of course, exceptions to this rule where one of the badges is particularly expensive. A satisfactory agreement is then reached, usually 2:1, 3:1, or 3:2. Contrary to what some people's beliefs, badges from other countries are not really more valuable than your own district badge. Some are hard to get, some are expensive (especially U.S. "shoulder patches"), while many are of the cheaper silk embroidered variety. Usually foreign badges trade 1:1 with maximum of 3:1.

Unfortunately there are a few leaders and boys who will try to take advantage of the trust and goodwill which are a part of Jamboree spirit. Be on the lookout for phrases like : "really Rare", "only a few made", "I don't like to part with it", and "Means an awful lot to me". Beware of the high pressure types - remember you don't have to say yes! Don't agree to trade or shake hands unless you are satisfied and happy. There are 15,000 other guys to swap with.

When in doubt the best thing is to get some advice. At the Badgers Club display area. You will find a complete set of Canadian district badges and scouts, Ventures, and Scouter for whom badge collecting is an enjoyable hobby. They will be glad to answer your questions and discuss your collection with you. While it is impossible to police the many thousands of people who will be trading at CJ'77, the club is willing to help in settling disputes involving trading.

Parts of the Scout uniform should not be regarded as trading items nor should any badge be removed from the uniform for swopping. Our uniforms must remain complete for the Jamboree and the trip home. We are proud to represent our province and our community at CJ'77. We'll show this by keeping our uniforms looking sharp and complete.

Apart from the official Jamboree Trading Post etc., badges, crest and similar items shouldn't be sold on the site. Swopping is far more rewarding anyway.

Carry out Jamboree swapping in the spirit, brotherhood, and fellowship of Scouting. Unfair tactics, high-pressure salesmanship and adults taking advantage of the trust of the boys have no place at our Jamboree or in Scouting. Those who are not interested in trading have every right to their preference, and those who can only afford a few items to trade should not be discouraged. Swapping is just one of many great activities at CJ'77. Let's make it fun for everyone.
