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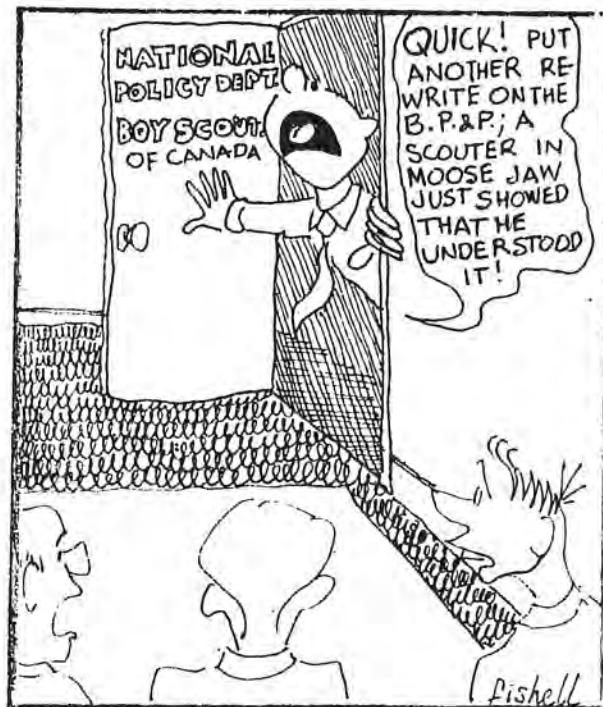

"Articles of Yore" is a new column which should be appearing again in future issues of the magazine. The intention of the article is to assist other collectors, who like myself have

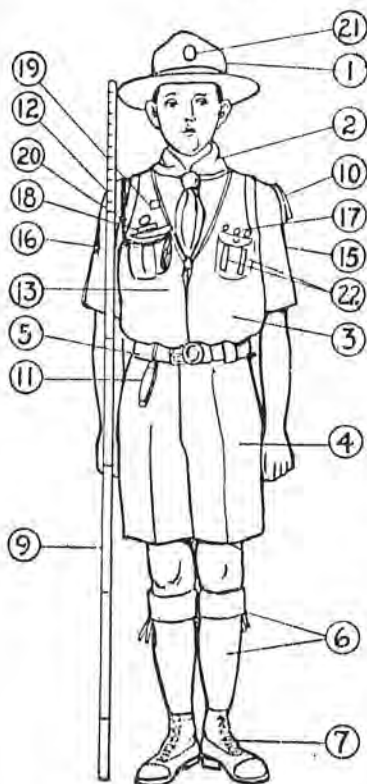

Boy Scouts

Sec. 40.—Scout Uniform



1. HAT.—Khaki colour, flat brim, crown with four dents, strap round crown, and lace. (The lace should be worn at the back of the head and tied on brim of the hat at front.)

2. NECKERCHIEF.—Of the troop colours. Each troop is entitled to make its own choice of neckerchief colours, subject to such choice being ratified by Local Association. The neckerchief is worn knotted at the throat (or held in position by a troop ring, other than Gillwell pattern), and half hitch bent on shorter end.

3. SHIRT.—Khaki, green, grey or blue, with two patch pockets (buttoned) and shoulder straps, and BOY SCOUTS—CANADA badge over right breast pocket. Sleeves rolled—roll inside.

4. SHORTS.—Blue or khaki (Scottish Scouts may wear the kilt and sporran in place of shorts). When standing, bottom of shorts should reach top of knee-cap.

Boy Scouts may not appear in military breeches and puttees.

5. BELT.—Brown leather or web, with swivels.

6. STOCKINGS.—Blue or black with khaki or green tops worn turned down below the knee with green garter tabs showing on outside.

7. BOOTS OR SHOES.—Brown or black.

8. HAVESACK.—Worn as a knapsack.

9. STAFF.—Marked in feet and inches, five feet six inches in length.

10. SHOULDER KNOT.—Six inches long of Patrol colours on left shoulder. Troop Leader wears shoulder knot to correspond with the colours of his former patrol.

11. KNIFE.—(Optional) On belt or lanyard.

12. SHOULDER BADGE.—Indicating the troop, may be worn on authorization by Provincial Council.

13. LANYARD.—(Optional) To carry whistle.

14. GREATCOATS, MACKINTOSHES, ETC.—(Optional) If not worn to be carried on top of haversack.

15. KING'S SCOUT BADGES.—Worn on left arm. King's Scout badge above first class badge, qualifying proficiency badges surrounding King's Scout badge.

16. PROFICIENCY BADGES.—Worn on the right arm in parallel rows between the shoulder and elbow except those badges which qualify for the King's Scout and King's Sea Scout badges. The ambulance badge is worn on both arms.

17. SERVICE STARS.—Centre of star half an inch above centre of left shirt pocket (see section 158).

17 (a). SCOUT BADGE.—Of cloth, worn on centre of left breast pocket.

18. WAR SERVICE BADGES.—Worn immediately above centre of right shirt pocket.

19. LIFE SAVING MEDALS.—Worn on right breast.

20. ALL ROUND CORDS.—Worn on right shoulder, around arm, under shoulder strap of shirt and looped across pocket. (See Sec. 163.)

21. PATROL LEADER'S HAT BADGE.—Worn on front of hat. Troop Leader's Hat Badge—same as Patrol Leader, but worn on left side of hat.

22. RANK STRIPES.—Troop Leader, three stripes. Patrol Leader, two stripes. Second, one stripe. These are worn on left shirt pocket follows: Troop Leader, one on each side of pleat and one on pleat itself; Patrol Leader, one on each side of pleat; Second, one on right side of pleat. Stripes to be one-half inch wide, and three inches long of white tape.

23. SCOUT AXE.

24. WINTER UNIFORM.—A complete Winter Uniform has now been authorized, to be worn by all members of the Association, consisting of:—Touque, mackinaw overcoat, breeches, stockings and boots. (All obtainable from Stores Department, Dominion Headquarters, Ottawa.)

25. PROVINCIAL EMBLEM.—As authorized by Provincial Councils.

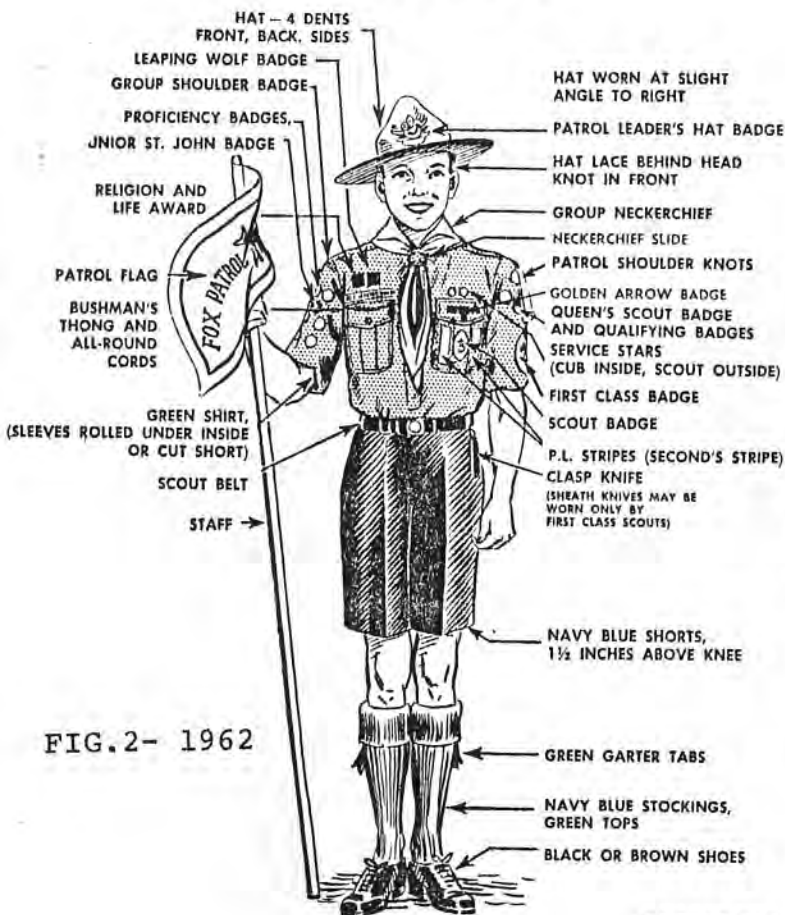

SCOUT

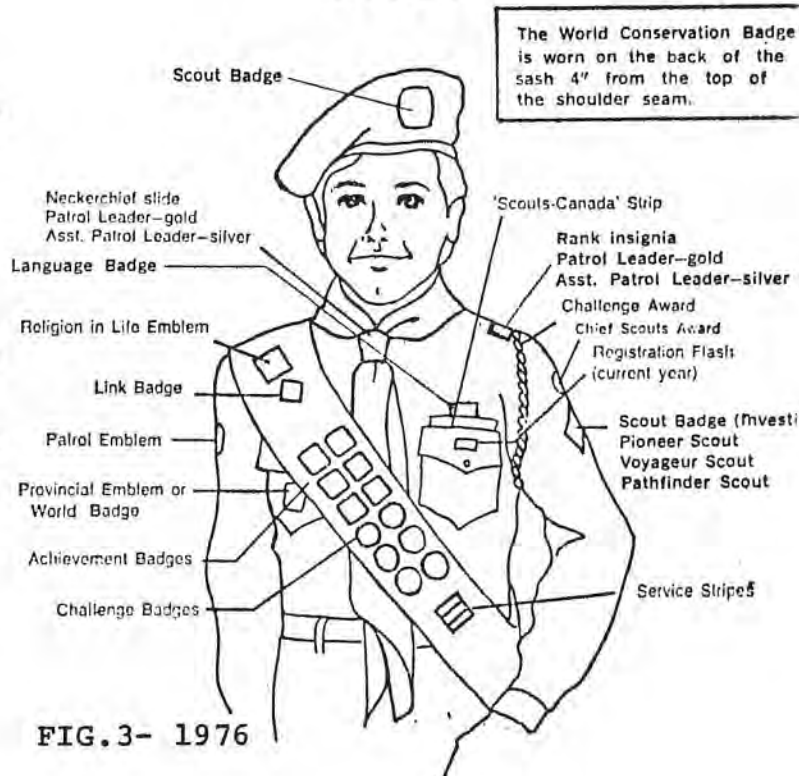

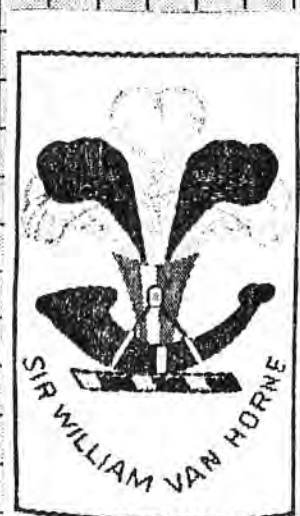

District Histories

As a special, this month, we are featuring Quebec District Histories. We would like to get some response from you! Send in your district history!

P.Q.E2 Montreal Eastern Lakeshore District This badge commemorates the Massacre of 1608, when Iroquois war parties wiped out all settlements from Point Clair to Lachine Rapids. The lettering of the badge is in green on a yellow background. Two black tomahawks with a snake on each stand out against the green hills and blue sky. The badge is edged in black.

P.Q.M1 MacDonald District (Montreal Region) This badge is a copy of the design of a medallion issued by Sir John A. MacDonald in 1892 but never used. The medallion is now in the possession of former Prime Minister Diefenbaker. The colours are brown, black, green, and red on a yellow field.

P.Q.A1 Algonkin District This badge shows an Algonkin Indian at the bow of his canoe spearing fish and eels. The Indian and canoe are white, the water green, the sky red, and the sun gold.

P.Q.L1 Lake of Two Mountains District This badge is designed as a shield. The heraldic design signifies the mountains on a sunset background. The colours are blue for Sea Scouts, green for Scouts and red for Rovers. The border and field are yellow for Cubs.

P.Q.R3 Richelieu Valley District The fort on the badge symbolizes the chain of forts belonging to the British and French, along the Richelieu River which appears in the foreground. The mountain on the right represents the Montegaine chain of volcanic extrusions in the district. The badge is woven in red, yellow, and green.

P.Q.S6 St. Francis Valley District This badge is red, green and yellow which portrays symbolically the forests and river which are the resources for the District's principal industries-pulp and paper, asbestos mines, textiles, ship building and iron ore plants.

P.Q.V1 Sir William Van Horne District This badge takes its name from Sir William Van Horne, the man who worked his way from office boy to general manager of the C.P.R.. The blue, gold, silver, black, and red badge features the family crest of Van Horne.

P.Q.S11 Stoney Point District The existence of the Lachine Rapids, a natural barrier to navigation, brought prominence to the Stoney Point area. Fur laden canoes from Canada's hinterland were unloaded here. The alternative was shooting the Rapids, possible though highly dangerous. This was, as well, an embarkation point for western travel and exploration. The canoe on the Stoney Point flash symbolizes these facts from history. The recent past saw the Lachine Canal as a vital navigational link in the water route from the Great Lakes to the inland port of Montreal. Stoney Point was the western extremity of this system of locks. Thus the flash includes a lighthouse on a rocky promontory. The Stoney Point area is an industrial centre of considerable importance. On the flash therefore, a factory has been added. The Stoney Point flash tells a graphic story. The historical past, the more recent past, and the present are represented appropriately.

P.Q.H1 Huron District This badge stands for the Huron Indians who lived in the area of Auduburn Park on the Richelieu River. The Huron tribe belonged to a nation of 6 tribes. The 4 Indian signs of the badge symbolize 4 different things: Top left-bear paw, Top right-a rock, Bottom left-a rope, Bottom right-deer tracks. The central figure is a Thunderbird symbolizing the whole Huron Nation. The three peaks signify Mount Bruno, Mount St. Hilaire, and Mount Rougemont. The symbols, mountain peaks, thunderbird, and border are white. The writing is yellow and mountains are green embroidered on a red background.

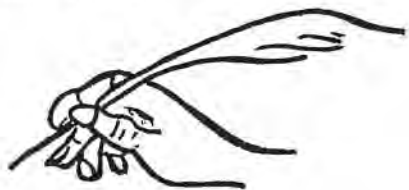

A well deserved criticism for failure in this regard was levelled at the executive during the recent general meeting in Toronto. So, here goes

Twenty-nine members attended the general meeting held in Toronto on October 23rd, 1977. The entire morning was spent in swapping (both badges and stories) and renewing friendships. Out-of-town representation added a further dimension to the activities.

The meeting came to order at 2:10 pm, with Dave Bushell presiding as acting chairman in the absence of Norm Paget who was attending a weekend camporee (like a good, troop scouter should). Following the usual procedural routines a general discussion on a variety of topics ensued. Reported here-in is a random summary of member's views and comments:

- the International club should be kept informed of our activities.
(It is done, albeit through our magazine. Secty)
- Membership should be made aware of club decisions which could be published in magazine. (Sounded like an excellent idea. Secty)
- the objective of the Canadian Chapter, at this juncture, is to satisfy the needs of the younger and newer member rather than place emphasis on the international scope of badge collecting.
- publish non-renewing members names in magazine so that active members can maintain accurate listing. (Will do. Secty)
- Some new members who joined at CJ 77 still had not received even so much as an acknowledgement. (Membership chairman explained and apologized to those involved. Secty)
- membership should inform the executive concerning likes and dislikes.
(Good idea. Secty)
- some of the technical functions ought to be delegated to those capable of carrying out such duties; eg, membership, catalogist, editor, etc and should not be elective positions. (In fact this is happening -- John Getgood of Kitchener is our catalogist, and Bill and Diane Kelly of Montreal are our Magazine publisher and Editor. Secty)
- Establish 'regional' reps to organize local swoporees and other regional activities. (Montreal held a successful swoporee on October 15th. Secty)
- the desirability of a nationally flavoured executive which for practical

reasons such as convenience and effectiveness, almost has to be centralized.

- Essentially, five working regions are or could be in existence --
Maritimes, Quebec (Montreal), Southern Ontario (Toronto),
Prairies and West Coast.
- rotating the executive responsibilities through the above regions is
worthy of further examination.
- so as to encourage all members to participate in selecting an executive,
ballots and biographies are to accompany the next magazine issue.

Membership Report:- as of October 1977, renewed members 72
new members 67
current membership 139

Club Duties:- Diane and Bill Kelly have agreed to fulfill the role of magazine editor and publisher.

Brian Lacroix offered his services as Quebec regional rep and
Mark Weinberg for Ontario region.

(Many thanks people. Secty)

Magazine Advertising:- It was agreed to sell space in the magazine at the rate
of \$2.00 per block, or \$12.00 per full page for members - \$30.00
for non-members. One page contains 6 blocks. Club members
still will receive free space to list wants, etc provided it
is received in the prescribed format, ie, typed and not larger
than 5" x 4" in size.

Chain Letters:- This method of trading badges was initially raised at a general
meeting earlier this year (April 2nd). It did NOT meet with
the approval of those in attendance, primarily because of the
'rip-off' factor for the younger swopper(s), who, bedazzled by
the prospect of receiving 'hundreds' of badges, dutifully
posts his badges according to instructions and adds his name
to the bottom of the list, only to one day discover that some
clot has broken the chain, and he ends up with nothing.

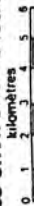
There are several other reasons which need not be gone into

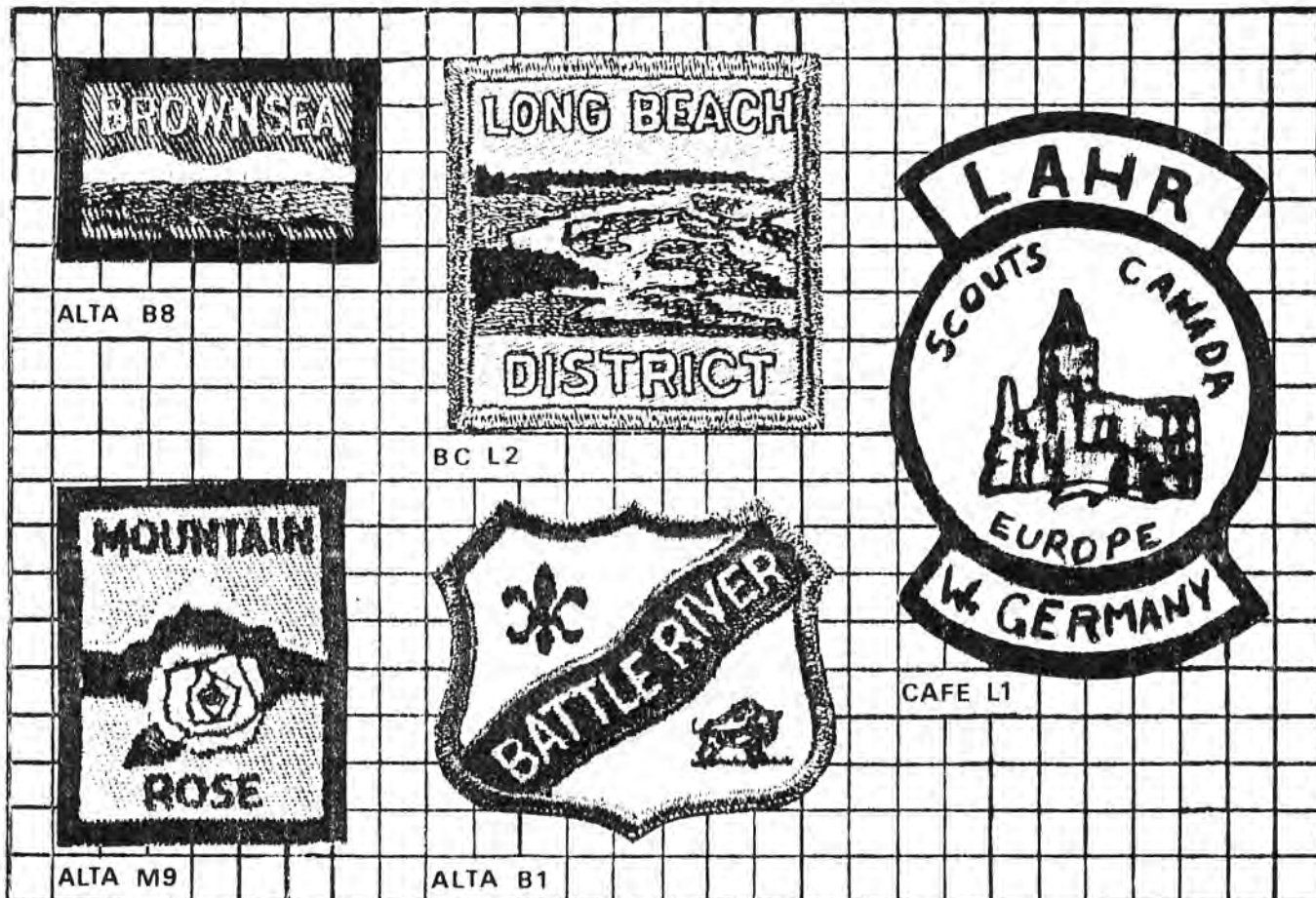

The First Scout Law...

More than once people have come up to me with questions concerning different badges. Everyone who collects patches, whether it be districts, jamborees or C.S.P.'s, will eventually come across a badge which makes him wonder and ask:

- Is this an original or is it a reproduction?
- Or could it be a variation?
- How can it be considered extinct when there are so many of these badges available?

This article will be attempting to answer and clear up a few of these questions for all of us.

I'm sure it is common knowledge to most of you that certain people reproduce badges. Whether the badges are identical to the original or not, I don't feel that there is anything wrong with this practice unless, of course, they are misrepresented.

For instance let us look at 4 different badges which have caused some confusion.

In PHOTO 1 we have CAN/ONT Ext. E4 ETOBICOKE CENTRAL

Fig. 1 depicts the original ext. district badge

Fig. 2 depicts the group patch of identical design. This badge however is - 1/4 inch smaller than the original
- and inevitably has less detail and accuracy in the embroidery.

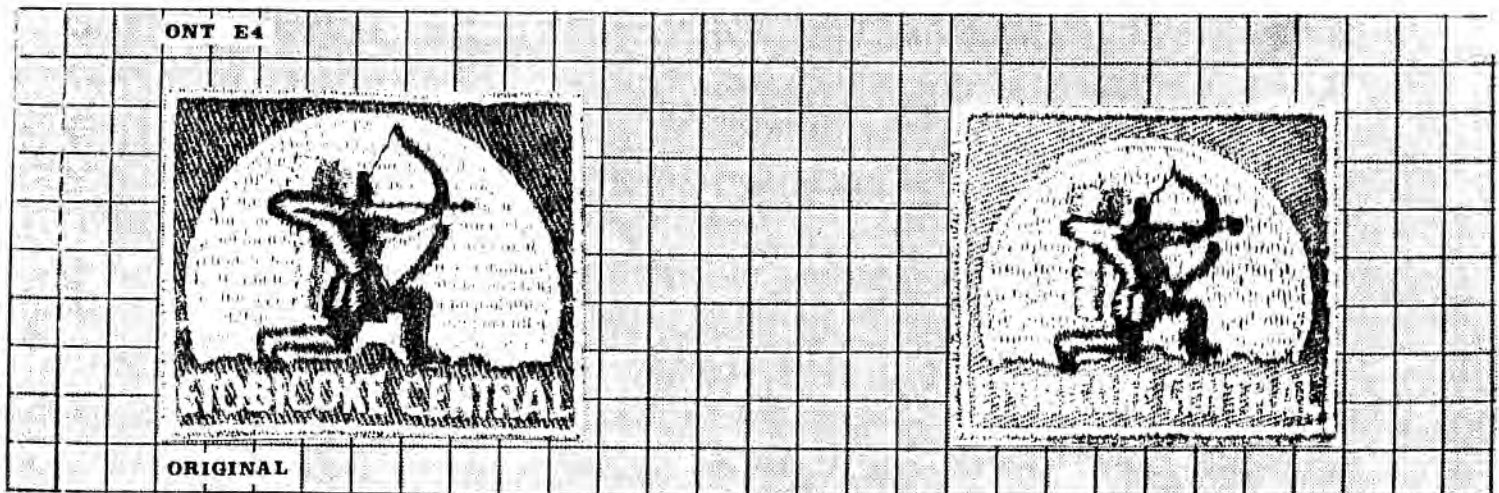

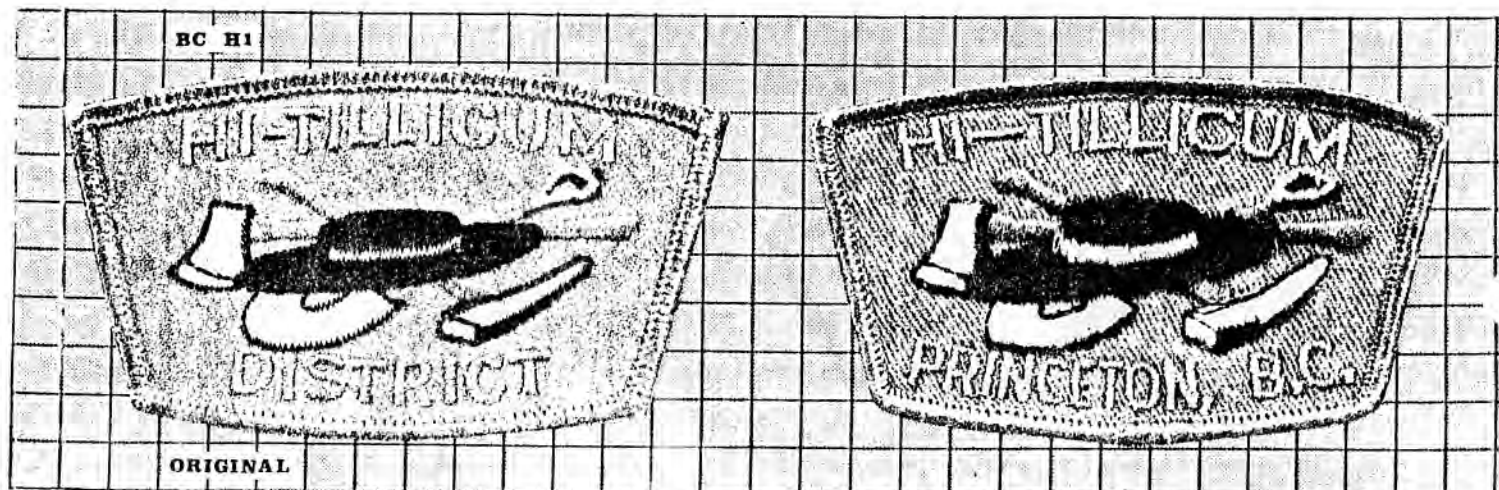

In PHOTO 2 we have CAN/B.C. Ext. H1 HI-TILICUM

I'm sure some of you will remember that this badge was previously mentioned in an earlier issue. I thought of mentioning it again for the sake of the newer members and to refreshen other memories.

Fig. 1 depicts the original badge

Fig. 2 depicts a group badge of identical design to the ext. district. This badge, however, has PRINCETON B.C. embroidered on instead of District.

In PHOTO 3 Fig. 1 we have CAN/ONT Ext.N2 NORTH PEEL

This is definitely an extinct district and badge. However, there apparently was a loom run which was ran off by mistake. Brampton district which has the identical design was supposed to be run off and NORTH PEEL was put out instead. Please note, that this district badge is presently easily available but still considered extinct.

In PHOTO 3 Fig. 2 we have CAN/ONT Ext. H4 HUMBER WEST

This is definitely an ext. district. Groups in the area however, are still using the patch as a troop crest. The patch is identical to the old district badge. In this case even though the district itself no longer exists as such, the badge still is currently used and therefore should be traded as such. - CURRENT for CURRENT.

Please note, that this badge should be rated as a moderately difficult to get, current badge.

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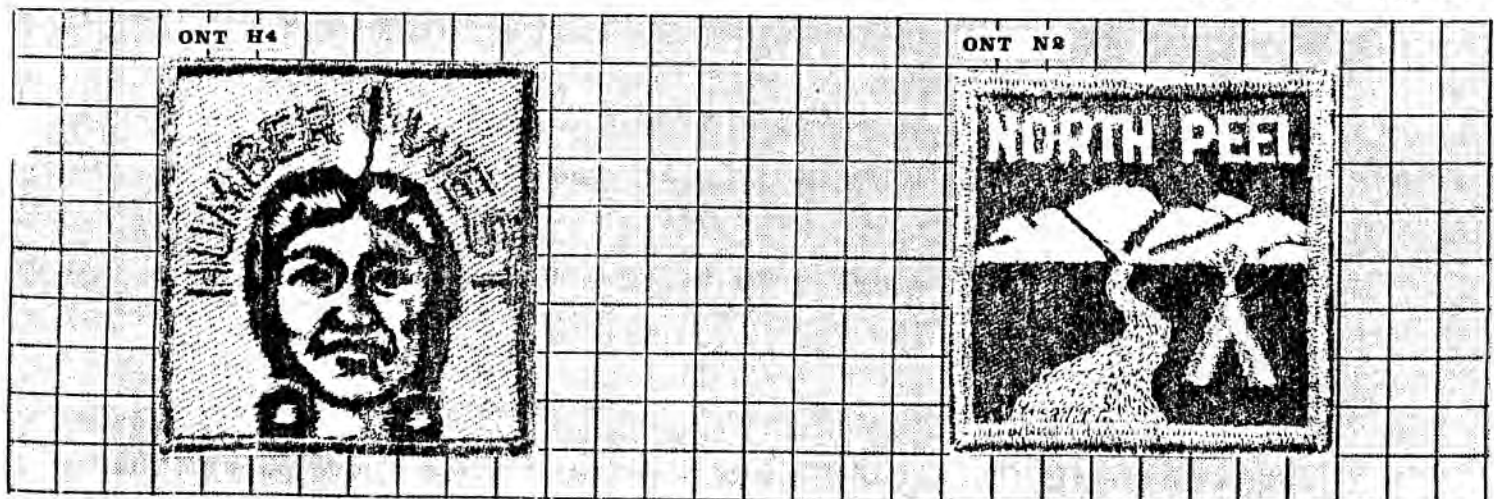

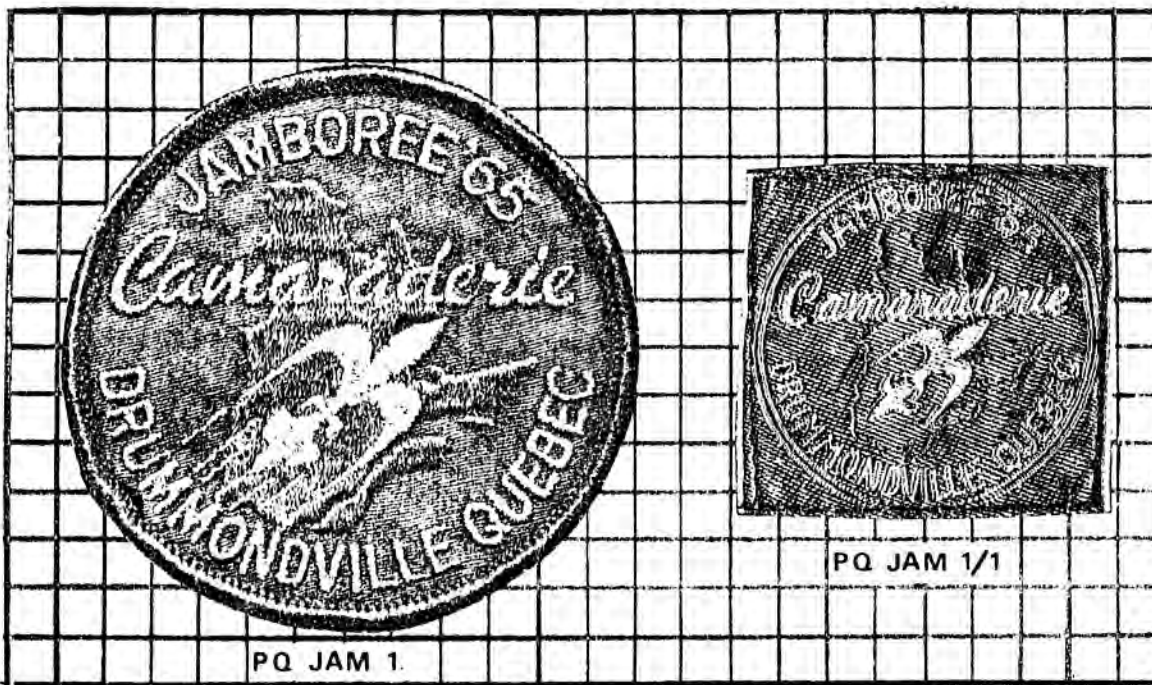

FIRST QUEBEC JAMBOREE



The first Quebec jamboree was held from July 4th to the 10th in 1965 as a joint effort between Les Scouts Catholiques and Boy Scouts of Canada. The jamboree was held in Drummondville, Quebec and had 1,400 participants.

There were 2 official items issued for this jamboree: one patch and one neckerchief

The first was a 3 inch round blue twill patch featuring the province of Quebec embroidered in brown, with the gold scout symbol in flight symbolizing the positive & forward outlook on Scouting in Quebec. All the lettering was also embroidered in gold and the border in red.

The second was a red colored neckerchief with a blue square silk patch sewn on. It was identical to the patch except for the border which was gold.

"Camaraderie" was the jamboree theme, meaning friendship.

You will only get out of it, whatever you put into it and when I say this, it is with tongue in cheek. Because if you wish to go all out and try to collect every badge from every country, it will be a very costly and a very time consuming hobby, on the other hand, if your wish is to stay strictly within the confines of your Area, Region or Province, this can be done with a minimum of time and money.

I would however like to offer a few guidelines for or to badge collectors, from the new collector just starting out, whither it be a Scout or an adult, to the 'old time' collector, who is looking for that 'old' rarie, that has been talked about, but never or very rarely ever seen, with the hopes that someone, somewhere may dig out of the woodwork.

First of all I like to classify badges into five catagories, from 1 to 5, in doing this, we must remember, the costs of these badges will vary anywhere from 15¢ to \$1.75 each.

1. Current issue badge, (from larger Districts, Regions or Areas that order badges by thousands at a time.
2. Current issue badge, (from smaller Districts, Regions or Areas that order smaller numbers of badges at one time.
3. Generally extinct badges, (from Districts, Regions or Areas that have ceased to exist or merged with others or expanded and formed two or three new Districts.
4. Hard to get varieties of extinct badges, (badges from smaller District that have been extinct antwhere from 2 to 10 year
5. Extremely hard to get extinct badges, (such as some old silk roll types printed on felt types or ones that have been extinct beyond the 10 year period of time.

In swapping a badge, please put yourself in the place of the person you wish to swap with, the badge you have to offer and the badge you wish to swap for. This is where the cost figures really come into the picture, for an example; A large Region or District with a two color and a two inch badge may order several thousand, thusly their cost would range between 10¢ to 20¢ per badge, where as the smaller District with a 4, 5 or 6 colored badge of a 3 inch size ordering a minimum number, their cost would range anywhere from \$1.25 to \$1.75 each. If you were to swap on a one for one basis, it wouldn't be long before you were to quit collecting badges if you were the one supplying the expensive badge and bulk swaps would definately be out of the question. So why not take these conditions into consideration when swapping.

Another point about swapping is that, when someone writes to you, they are expecting an answer, whither they have asked about the possibilities of swapping or the possibilities of buying some of your badges, try to answer all mail within the 7 to 10 day period of time, there will always be exceptions to this through sickness or vacations but a post card will let the person know you did receive his/her letter.

It is not just the fact of collecting those badges that count, but the friendships that are created by corresponding with other people from other parts of your area, province or country that prove very worthwhile and when the opportunity arises to meet that person, it's not as if you are meeting a complete stranger but right now you have something in common. It has been through this hobby that I have done a fair amount of travelling not only in Canada but other countries as well and met a great number of real swell people and can only say 'THANK YOU' for the hospitality that has been offered to me.

"Let's swap a badge".
