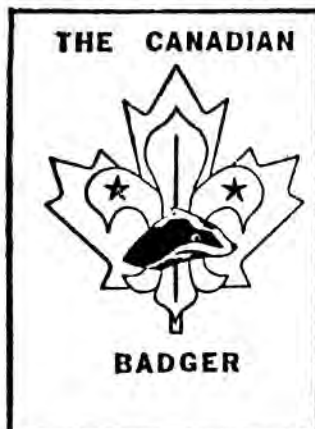

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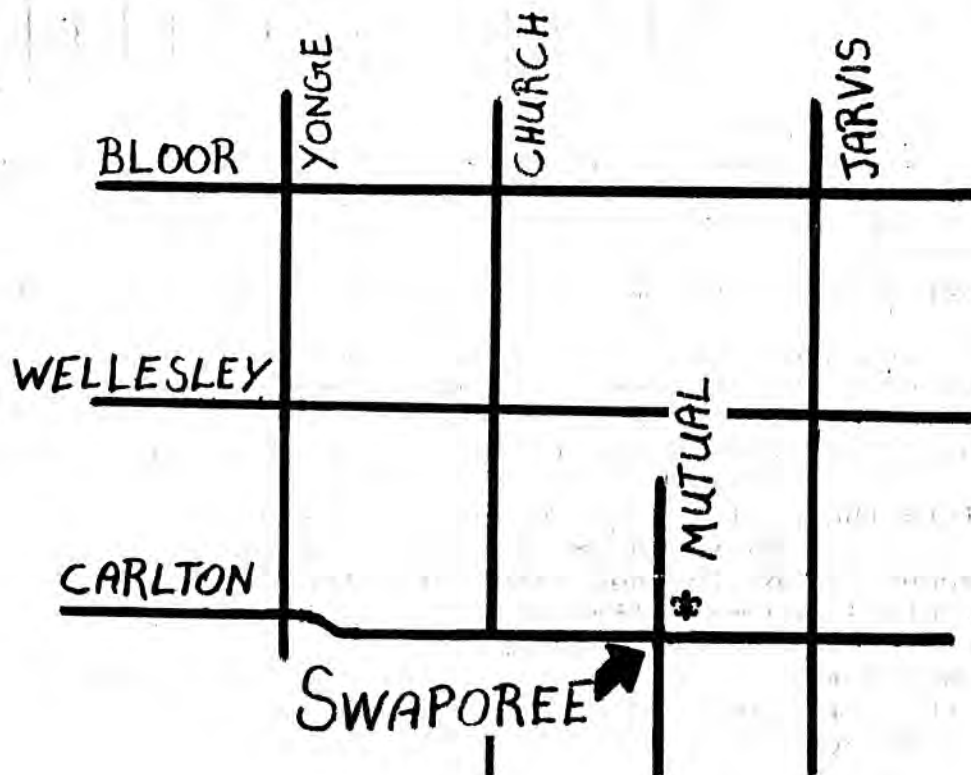


Club Meeting

The third Alberta Jamboree was held at Sylvan Lake's Camp Woods, halfway between Edmonton and Calgary. Approximately 1,500 scouts and scouters gathered together to "develop world scouting" from June 29th to July 6th in 1963.

Dry land skiing, tug of war, rifle shoots, tree felling and boating were just a few of the activities held and enjoyed at the Jamboree.

In keeping with Brotherhood Year, an international flavor was added to the scene by the presence of scouts from Mexico, Brazil, Peru and Haiti. Other scouts who attended came from Idaho, Montana, Washington, Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Resolute Bay.

Fig 1 depicts the official patch for the jamboree

This is a 3 inch round green twill patch.

The scout symbol is used along with the scout sign, as the central and main figures.

The scout sign is of a pinkish white color along with the 1963 date.

All other writing and border are gold along with the scout symbol.

Dear Diane & Bill:

First of all let me comment on the new format of the magazine, of which I think you have done a very good job. I like the way you added the new various sections such as Scouting Memorabilia as well as your format of illustrations of badges accompanied with their histories. The idea of showing size and descriptions of new badges is also very well done.

I do however take exception to the article on page 12 & 13, in that although we are members of a club, whether it be buttons or badges, we do not have the right to dictate to any Group Committee or Troop or Venturer Company who are still operating as such although the District has gone under, as to the wearing of their badges, if they so desire to use the format of their former District badge, whether with or without any changes, is completely their doing and is a problem that we will have to put up with, some such as in figure or photo 2 have changed the wording, in photo 1, I imagine their idea was to duplicate the badge, but due to a manufacturing error this was the result.

As for the NORTH PEEL badge in photo 3, the human being is not infallible and each of us through our lives will make mistakes, it so happens a person in the manufacturing and made this mistake. I guess you might say that I am as guilty as anyone, in that I purchased several of these badges at a less cost than had I bought them when they were a current badge, it was through the friendship of a representative of this company that I bought these and with them I am now able to supply new or younger members of our club with a badge that is cancelled as extinct, and will be able to do so for quite some time.

You failed to mention as well about the 'BLACK MARKET' of badges by districts across Canada who see fit to make a larger margin of profit from people like us who collect badges. I can sight you at least four examples of this that I know of and I'm sure there is many more. In one case the badge costs the District 20¢ each they in turn sell to the District members for 35¢ each, making a 75¢ profit to their district, but for someone outside the District to purchase a single badge or in multiples it costs 70¢ each. In another case the badge costs the District 40¢ each, they in turn sell them to their District members for 50¢ each, but to the outside of the District person \$1.00. If we are to continue to swap badges on a basis of one for one, I think it is only fair that when a person has the opportunity to buy badges at a cheaper price whether they be extinct or current is only fair to effect the other.

However in the last few years, these same companies have had so many calls for these badges, that they in most cases have discontinued this practise. I still have contacts in a couple of these companies and will continue to buy their overs. If however you or other members feel that I am or have taken advantage of you, I would be very pleased to hear about it.

On page 5 Bill, you were asking for a columnist for CSP's, I'm not offering my services, but have enclosed an article that I copied from the Australian Chapter's booklet called 'SHOP', which was written by Bob Gylkowski from the U.S.A. which I think covers what you are looking for.

I am also enclosing a couple of photostats of two S.C. badges of which I have in my collection that are not listed. In photo 1 I have given you the colors as well as the actual size of the badge and in #2 you can see more clearly the outline of the bird in the WESTINGHOUSE badge.

CSP INFO

COLLECTING C.S.P.'s

Council Shoulder Patches (CSP) issued in the U.S.A. are something of a phenomenon. Through the history of the Boy Scouts of America, two basic types of shoulder identification insignia were used. These came in white on red in more recent years, and different colors in earlier years.

Some councils used a solid one-piece council strip commonly known as an R/Ws. Early issues were red on khaki, while later issues were white on red. Blue on white, white on blue were also used, and still are by many councils which have Sea Exploring programs. *SHOWN IN FIGURE 1*

Multi-color council patches were authorized for the pocket only. Many councils issued multi-color shoulder patches in the 1950's and '60's, but were not authorized by the Uniform and Insignia Committee and were discontinued. Finally though, the demand for these CSP's became so great that a letter was sent to all councils on April 17, 1970, from the National Supply Division, authorizing them to switch if they so desired. Since then, all but 38 councils have adopted the CSP as their identification insignia. One council, Bay Lakes, has the distinction of changing to a CSP, and then back to a R/W which they presently use.

With this letter, three sample patches were sent: Circle Ten (not the same as the regular Circle Ten CSP), Columbiana-Johnny Appleseed (no such council ever existed), and Paul Bunyan. They were made in three different shapes to give the councils some kind of a guideline to use. These patches have become such collector's items that they were re-issued by the Supply Division in 1976. But like most re-issues, they were not perfect copies and the originals are still difficult to obtain. *SHOWN IN FIGURE 2*

CSP collecting caught on right away. They were cheaper and sometimes more attractive than OA (Order of the Arrow) flaps, they were not restricted (usually), but mostly, they were available to all B.S.A. members, not to just the few who were in OA. This opened the gates to many more potential traders and collectors.

A major change in the CSP's occurred in 1977, when the National Council informed all councils that all patches now issued must have one of the corporate symbols on them. This was done so as to protect the patches under the copywrite from the people who were faking them.

The approved corporate symbols are: *SHOWN IN FIGURE 3*

1. Boy Scouts of America (or just BSA)
2. Scouting/USA or SCOUTING/ESA
3. A fleur-de-lis

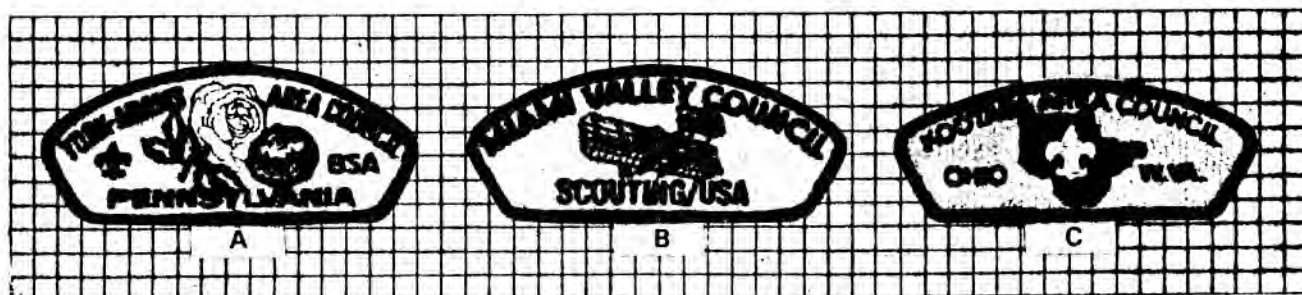

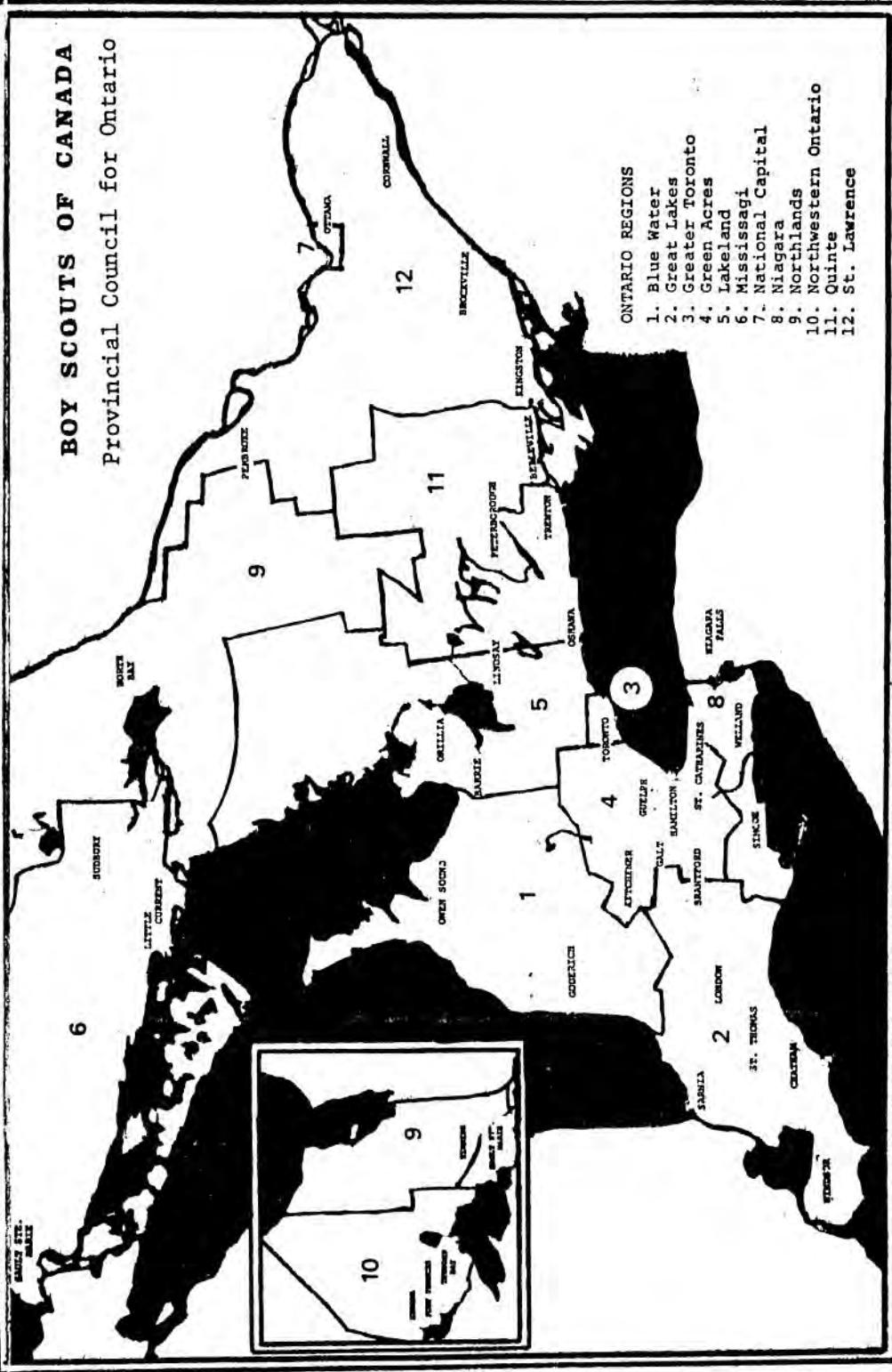

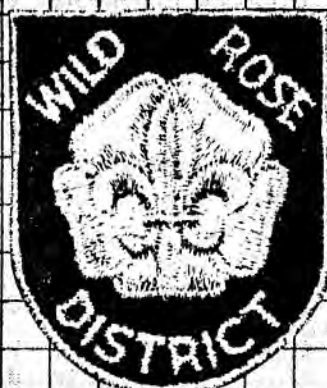

B.C. C2 Carlton District This is the coat of arms of Sir Guy Carlton, the first Baron of Dorchester. Sir Guy was elevated to the peerage August 21st, 1786, in recognition of his services to the 14th Colony (Canada) during the American wars. The coat of arms of Sir Guy Carlton consists of a shield scattered with crosses with a bend of three government arrows dexterwise (points to the right). The colors are counterchanged argent (silver) and sable (black). The government arrows signify military service to the Crown. The supporters of the shield are two Canadian beavers wearing crown-like collars of the rank of Sir Guy. The colours of the beavers is purple (purple), and their crown-like collars, Or (gold). The beavers stand on Or (gold) compartments to which the motto would be attached. The shield is surmounted by an Or (gold) coronet with four balls. The four balls on the crown indicate Sir Guy's rank, i.e., Baron. The crown is surmounted by a Helm (helmet) and wreath. The Helm is argent (silver) and the wreath purple (purple). The crest surmounting the Helm consists of a dexter arm embowed, naked to the elbow, grasping an arrow in an industrious person with the arrow indicating a warrior or soldier. The District uses the coat of arms of Sir Guy (often miscalled crest) without its motto.

EXT. P.Q. G1(s) Gaspé District This badge was designed in 1964-65 by 2 Murdochville (Que.) scouts; Glenn Mullen and Bill Palmer. It was designed to show the major Gaspé industries, fishing--the fish, farming--the sythe, mining--the pick & shovel, and lumbering--the trees. The whole crest was enclosed in a tree to symbolize the forests.

SASK. B1 Battleford District This badge centres on Fort Battleford, formerly an R.C.M.P. fort and now an historic museum. The yellow palisades and gates symbolize the fort. The colours scarlet and gold pay tribute to the R.C.M.P. and the jumping fish and blue water indicate the North Saskatchewan River which runs through the district to the hunting and fishing ground of the northwest.

ONT L1 London District The light blue ribbon represents the North and South branches of the Thames River and is a reminder that London arose from a rough pioneer outpost where these two rivers join. It was in the year 1826 that the first house was built near the forks of the Thames. This section of Western Ontario is particularly well known for its trees and forests, and the tree outline in the lower left corner of the badge is symbolic of this great natural resource that we are privileged to enjoy. From the earliest days London has been a garrison town, and the turret in the lower right corner of the badge symbolizes this aspect of our heritage. The scout emblem represents the district serving boys of every race, colour and creed in this area of Western Ontario.

ONT S10 South Waterloo District This district is located in the verdent valley of the Grand River, in the south central part of Ont. It incorporates the southern point of Waterloo County including the communities of Sheffield, Plattsville, Princeton and Drumbo. The pioneer's memorial tower, located near Doon, is shown in the centre of the badge -- a reminder of the spirit and courage of the early settlers. In the background are pictured industry and agriculture, both of equal importance in the district. The design for the badge was adopted in 1953 from an original design submitted by T.S. Ron Freeman.

EXT. CAFE M2 Fifth Maple Leaf District This district is made up of groups at the RCAF base in Metz, France. The badge's shape is that of the town of Metz and is colored black and white.

ONT B7 Burlington District This badge shows the head of Joseph Brant, Chief of the Mohawk Indian tribe which was closely associated with the early history of the area. The badge is bright red with white lettering. The Indian appears in brown, black, yellow, red and white.

ALTA W1 Wild Rose District This district is named for the abundance of the Provincial flower in the area and because the city of Camrose is known as "Rose City". The badge has a yellow Scout fleur-de-lys superimposed on a pink wild rose; a yellow border and the name of the district in white letters are set on a green background.

S.C. V1(s) Diocese Valleyfield This badge is blue at the top to indicate that the first troop in the district was started at Salaberry and red and green at the bottom to represent the second troop--the Bourget troop of Rigaud. The yellow lyre represents St. Cecile, patron saint of Valleyfield.
