Words from our Chairman

A few items of importance this time around...

T-shirts: As mentioned in the last magazine, club t-shirts will be available soon. Most members at the CJ '81 meeting and Toronto meeting felt that a shirt would be useful to identify members at various events and to publicize the club. They agreed that the shirt should be unique, ie. not a colour regularly used by contingents. As a result, the t-shirt will be black with white trim and a full-colour club logo (18X18cm) on the front. The cost is \$7.00 each including postage. To order, send me the number and size(s) you require by February 28th, along with the money. The shirts will be mailed out in March or early April. Quebec Auction: Last year, about 50 people gathered in Montreal for a meeting and 'blind' badge auction. A total of \$130 was raised and donated to the World Scout Brotherhood Fund, on behalf of the Canadian chapter. This event helps to promote the 'other' side of the Badgers Club, often neglected by those who are critical of our activities. Any support (badge donations) which you can send Stan (see p.16) would be most appreciated, both by the club, and by the Scouts of the developing countries which the fund supports. Even National HQ has donated badges for this auction... how about you???

Badge Book Sales: As many of you know, in 1980 the club undertook to produce The Canadian Badge Book; 129 pages of photographs illustrating all the Canadian district and jamboree badges. This project has tied up a great deal of money in inventory; money which is not available for other projects. We have noticed that many club members have not yet purchased a book. If you haven't bought one, please consider it. The book is a great help in badge identification and allows you to see those really rare items.

Scout Shops in general, have been receptive to selling the book but many have not been approached. If your local office is not selling it, ask to see if they'd be interested then let John Getgood know. If we all put forth a little effort, the sale of the books would really pick up and some needed cash would be released for other uses.

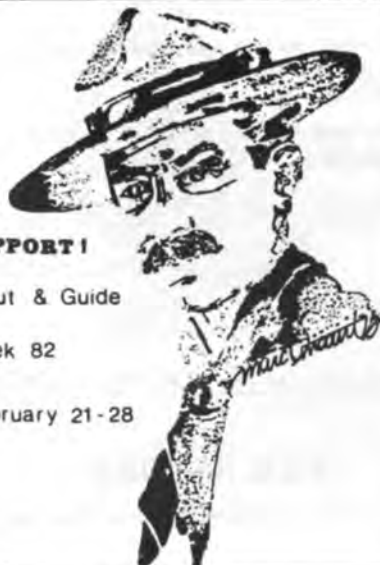

La Federation des Scouts Catholiques'

1st Jamboree

La Federation des Scouts Catholiques which joined with Les Scouts du Canada to form what we now know as La Federation des Scouts du Canada, was a part of the scout movement which strongly related with the Catholic faith. Catholicism which has always been strong in the province of Quebec, especially 30 years ago, played a very important role in a scouts life.

La Federation des Scouts Catholique de la Province de Quebec therefore held in 1951, a jamboree geared towards Catholic Scouts. This jamboree was held from Aug. 20th to Aug. 28th, at Vaudreuil, 25 miles west of Montreal.

The jamboree proved to be very successful with a total registration of 2,792 scouts, 60 chaplains and over 300 scouters which brought the attendance to well over 3,000.

The jamboree was divided into four sub-camps. Troops camped under the standard Patrol system and several troops of Catholic Scouts from the United States were in attendance.

The programme, which had to be changed frequently due do bad weather included physical demonstrations, tours of the Rigaud Shrine and the Oka Monastery, International Campfires, and general demonstrations of Scoutcraft.

The jamboree was visited by hundreds of Wolf Cubs and thousands of visitors attended the varied functions. The jamboree was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin.

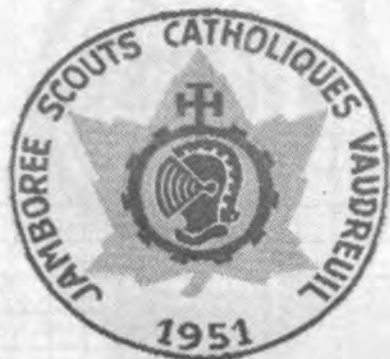
- Fig. 1 A.- This is a white silk type badge with a black border, lettering and church key. The maple leaf is silver and the knight's helmet is red.
- B.- This is a metallic church key ring which was used as a condensed form of the Rosary.
- C.- This is a small woven pennant which has a black maple leaf outline, key chain and lettering. The knights helmet is red.

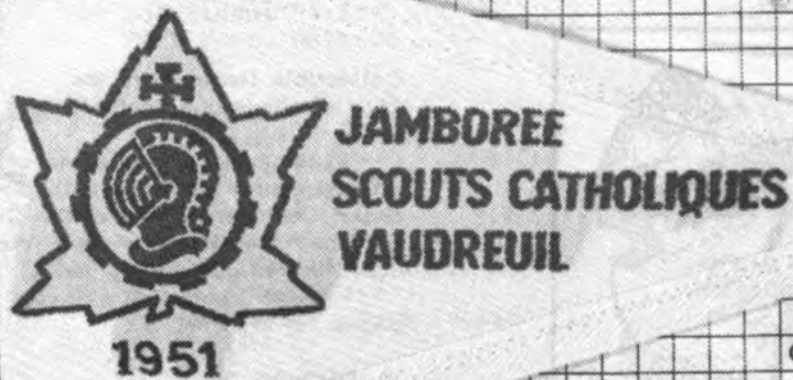

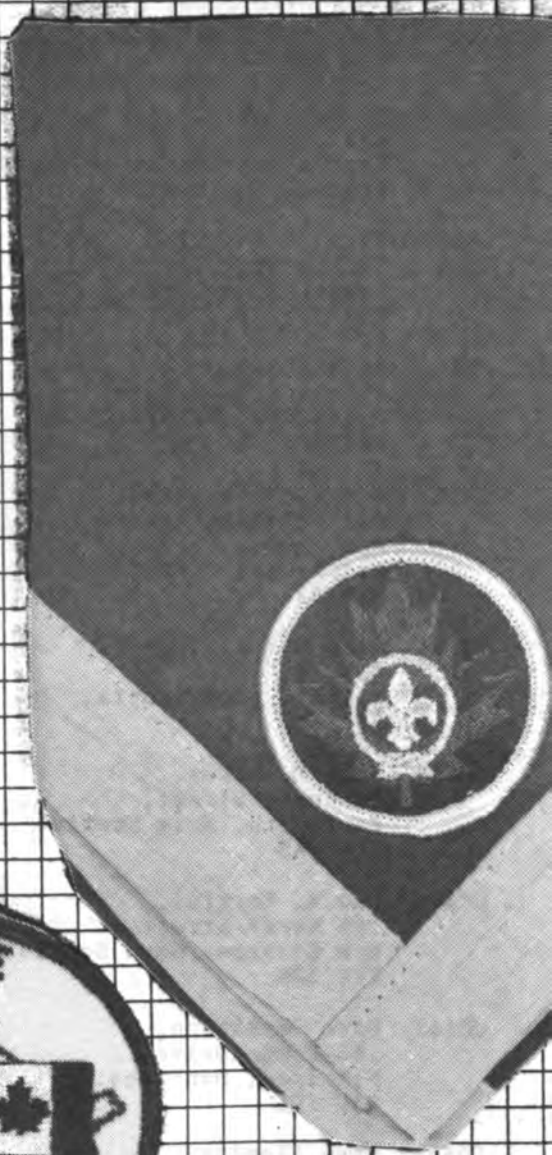

Letters to the Editor

More on letter writing:

One thing you should always do is be sure to use an appropriate sized envelope. Don't try to cram 10 badges into a little letter envelope, use a 9½" X 4½" size. I've received several damaged packets which apparently got stuck in the postal machinery. Using the wrong envelope means risking losing the badges.

Other tips suggested by Reni Barlow:

1- when sending more than 1 or 2 badges, tape them together in strips using masking tape. This prevents them from bunching up at one end and getting "stuck in the works". If the letter is still quite thick, print "HAND CANCEL" on the outside so it won't go through the machinery.

2- place a couple of pieces of scotch tape along the flap of the envelope but don't seal it completely. This protects you in case the envelope gives out but still allows air in and out for when it passes through the machinery. Sealing the envelope completely might cause it to burst with obvious results. I've never lost a badge yet via the post office in 9 years of trading so perhaps I'm doing something right!

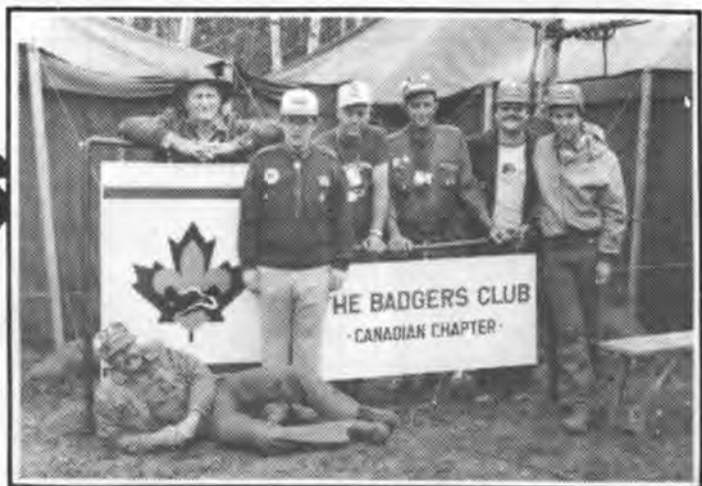

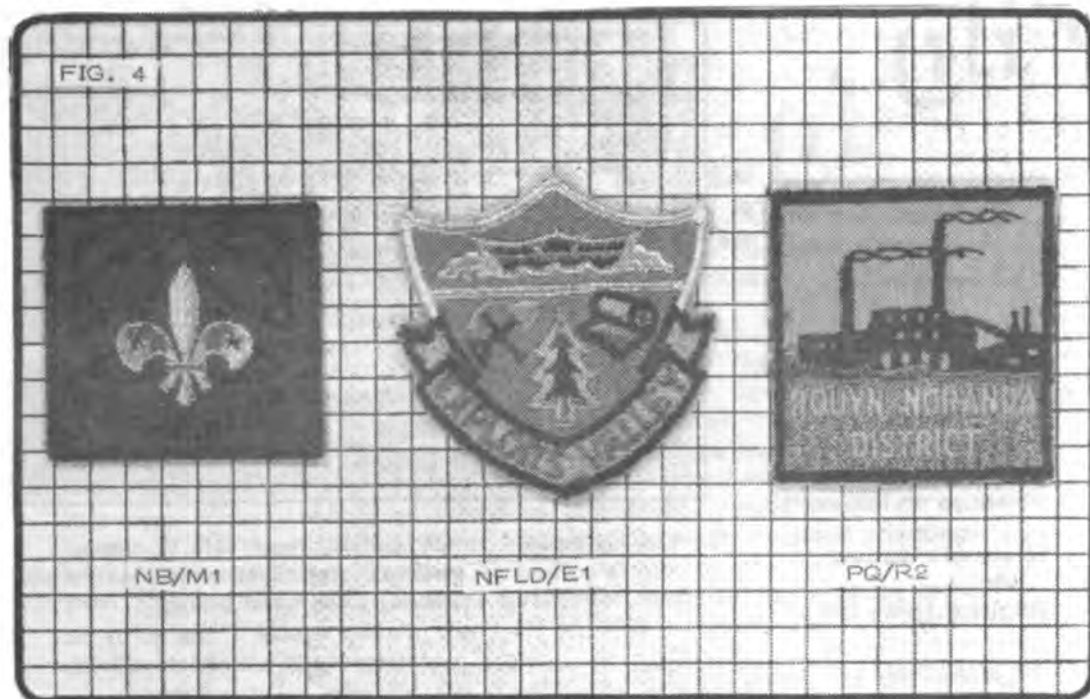

NB/M1, MIRAMICHI, New Brunswick, District's badge is green with two fish outlined in red, symbolic of the local fishing industry. The tree, also in red, represents the district's great lumber industry. The name appears in red below the yellow Scout fleur-de-lys.

NFLD/E1, Exploits Valley, Newfoundland, This district has been recently revived after being defunct nearly six years. The tree represents the large forests in the area and also the growing of Scouting. The roll for the pulp & paper industry and the pick & shovel for the tin mining at Badger! There is a canoe at the top of the badge for the Beotuk Indians who once lived in that area, the last of which was killed in the 1820's.

PQ/R2, Rouyn-Noranda District, Quebec, In 1923 a prospector named Edmund Harne came up to this region in the search of gold. He found enough to pay his need and then left without any afterthought. Three years later, in 1926, Harne found a Canadian industrialist, James Murdock, who would invest in the formation of a mine in this region, where he had previously come. The mine was established and the town had begun, its name, NORANDA drawn from Northern Canada. The mine continued to operate and the town grew steadily. In 1939 the mine changed from processing gold to processing copper, to supply the world markets. From 1965 to 1970 the town had greatly expanded to its present population, approximately 50,000 which includes its twin city Rouyn. The mine in Noranda, the Harne, was the major influence to provoke immigration to this region. On the scene portrays the Noranda Mines Harne Division with its two prominent smokestacks that are the main landmarks of the area and can be seen from miles around.
