JAMBOREE



The fourth Prince Edward Island Jamboree for Boy Scouts was held at Camp Buchan, Prim Point from July 29th to August 4th inclusive with just under 500 Scouts, Leaders and supporting Staff in attendance. The Jamboree Chief was the Provincial President, Brian J. Scott. The Deputy Chief was Donald R. Livingstone, Provincial Commissioner.

Scouts from Prince Edward Island were joined by Scouts and Leaders from Alberta, Magdalen Isles, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Labrador and a contingent from New Hampshire, Boy Scouts of America.

The opening ceremony was staged in front of the visitors stand and as the Scouts and Leaders marched onto the field they were greeted by the Patrons of Scouting; the Honourable Gordon Bennett, Lieutenant Governor; the Honourable Gordon Bennett, Lieutenant Governor; the Honourable Angus Maclean, Premier; Mr. Wilbur MacDonald, Member of Parliament for Cardigan and many other dignitaries.

The Jamboree was the culmination of a two year program designed to get Scouts out into a camping situation, to meet other Scouts from a distance and to give each the opportunity to take part in an exciting, adventure type program. The objective was successfully reached on the final day when each Scout present received his award for participation.

One of the highlights of the Jamboree was the visit of the National Commissioner, Chester Hull who spent two days touring the site and meeting boys and leaders.

It was an exciting event, all too short for the Scouts and Leaders present, an event that will be fondly remembered by those who attended and the friendships that developed will live with each participant for many, many years.

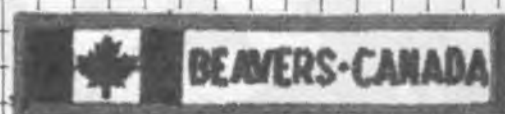

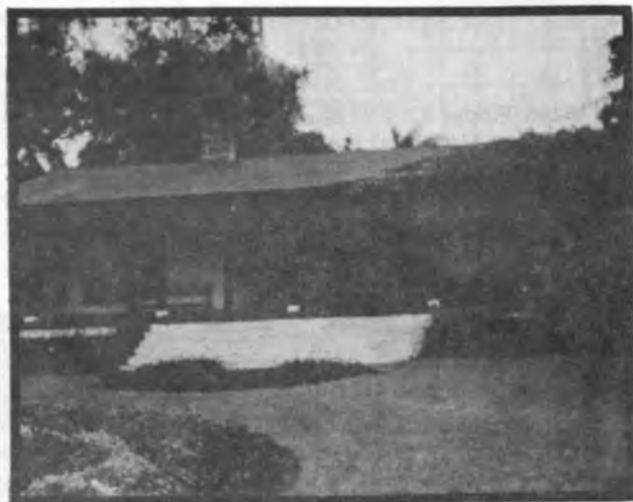

ing out the places where this man of visions has been. Brownsea Island in Poole Harbor is a beautiful spot to visit and see where "It all began", a paradise that is controlled and administrated by the National Trust of Great Britain who protects it from man himself and any personal greed that might arise. Scouts and Guides, the



World over enjoy camping there at the same spot where B.P. had his original encampment. Mafikeng, in the newly named country of Bohuthatswana claimed much of B.P.'s fame, His command during the Siege by the Boars in this tiny railhead city was the culmination of his military career, it made him famous, but not half as famous as his retirement from the military service so he could work full time for his new love the Boy Scouts. The movement blossomed into an International movement that was brought together at Olympia Stadium. This massive hall of steel and

glass put a new word before its members - Jamboree - and the success of this gathering brought him and thousands of boys to Arrow park in Birkenhead and its beautiful gardens into another Jamboree.

This man had a tiger by the tail and the membership showed it. He had what boys wanted and everybody wanted "in". His love of Africa

brought him to this country many times with the military and again in Scouting. I've climbed up the wooden steps at Treetops where he viewed game as they came to feed and drink. I've even been to Paxtu his retirement home on the grounds of the Outspan Hotel in Kenya where he spent his last days; yes, I've been to his grave in a small

churchyard in Nyeri where he was buried with full Military Honours attended by the Scouts and Guides of Kenya. Olave Baden Powell lies with him in the simple, well attended grave site with its famous gravestone inscribed with the "Gone Home" symbol ☉. In reality, this is not the end of "The Footsteps". They go onward to Gilwell Park in Chingford, Eng. thru the trained Woodbadge Holders that absorb this same Scouting that B.P. had emplantad in its sacred ground. It's still there, just as he left it. For as long as boys can be taught

The brown circle represents the Armdale Rotary and the roads leading into the district which are the Herring Cove Road and the St. Margarets Bay Road.

ONT./S11 St. Catharines & District This badge shows the many important activities which take place in the district. There is the rowing shell in the lower left corner for the Royal Canadian Henly Regatta which is held there. The shell is gold and white. The red grapes in the upper right are for the wine industry and the red, green and gold factory symbolizes the many diverse industries in the area. Upper center shows a white laker in the locks of the Welland Ship canal which runs through the area. The canal locks are in white and grey. All of this is on a green background with a green border.

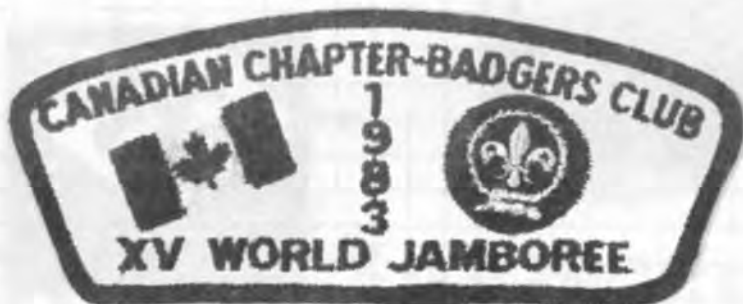

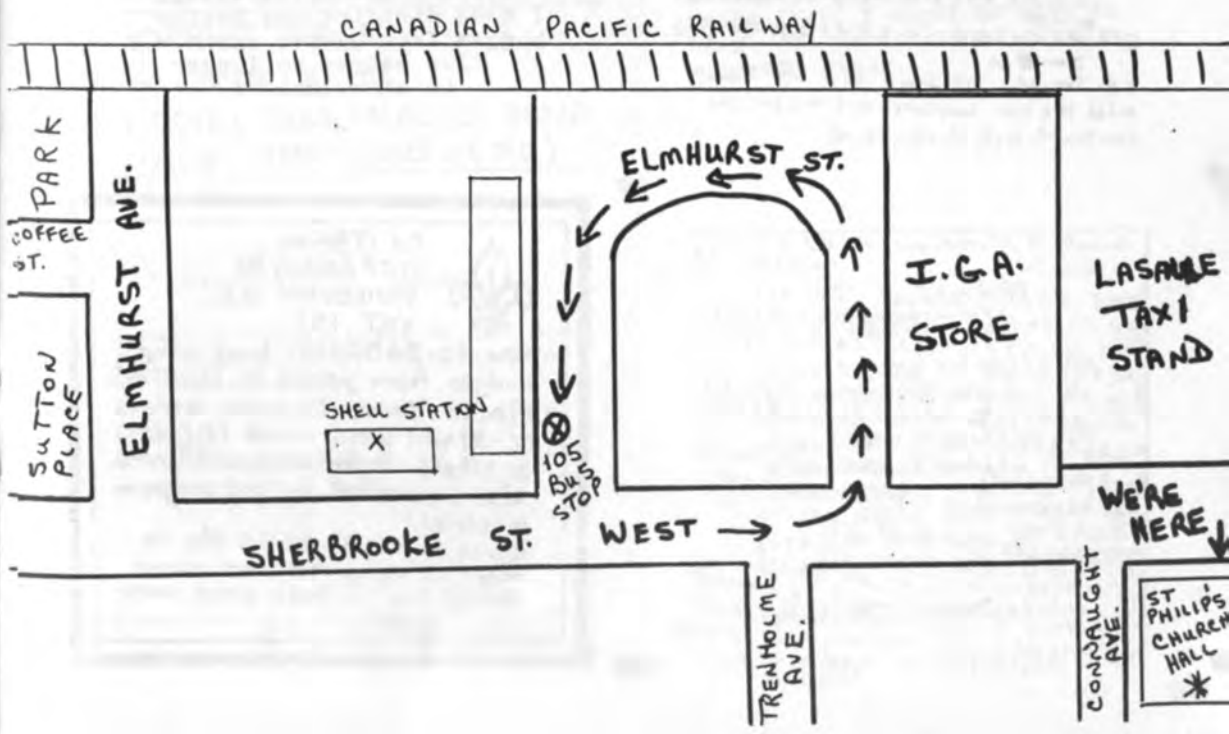
