He had said that we should get together some time and talk; he mentioned he had some stuff in a drawer. We finally sat down one night and he explained how he had earned this war service badge. There many drives during the war; paper, rubber, aluminium and especially blood. As not everybody had a telephone in those days, his troop accepted the task of delivering the notices to regular blood donors as to when and where the clinics would be held. The scouts kept a record on a calender of each day and the time spent. When the 100 hours was reached you recieved your badge, it also came in 200, 300, 400 hour increments.

It took just a little of my time and a little interest in local Scouting history with this older scouter and I came away with not only this treasure, but also a MINT DRGINAL FELT CJ49 BADGE!!!!!!!!! So, it doesn't always have to take a lot of dollars, just some diligent delving to find some very hard to find goodies.



PATROL LEADER HAT BADGES


Since Scouting's beginnings in the early 1900's to the program change in the late 60's, five distinct versions of the Patrol Leader's hat badge have been used in Canada.

- Figure 1. The earliest version was a two piece white/silver colored metal hat badge. The patrol leader wore both pieces on the front of his Stetson. The Second (or Corporal as he was called in the early days of Scouting) wore only the 2nd class scroll.
- Figure 2. In the mid 20's stars were added to the Fleur de Lis portion of the hat badge (the stars appeared on other scout badges much earlier than this).
- Figure 3. In the 1930's a new design was introduced. This type of badge remained in use in many parts of the British Commonwealth until the late 1960's.
- Figure 4. Rover Mates wore the Fleur de Lis portion of the badge over their "R-S" pin.
- Figure 5. Just prior to WWII a distinctly Canadian P.L.'s hat badge made by Scwlly of Montreal appeared. This design remained in use in Canada for almost 25 years and is the most common type.

During WWII this style of P.L.'s hat badge was made of wood and bakelite in order to conserve metal.

At CJ'89 an authorized reproduction was available for trade. This item is quite easy to distinguish from the original in that it is considerably heavier having been "cast" rather than "stamped".

Figure 6. The small P.L.'s hat badge appeared in about 1963 and was used until the new program and uniforms appeared. There is a plastic reproduction of this badge in existence.





CREE SASKATOON

In 1961, Saskatoon District was divided into 9 sub-districts. On April 20, 1961 it was decided that they should be given names that should be Indian. This is in keeping with the derivation of Saskatoon and Saskatchewan and, it is believed, will appeal to the boys. By November 1961, six of the sub-districts had names including: Apache, Blackfoot, Cree, Iroquois, Kootowan, and Sioux. On November 29, 1962 Saskatoon became a region and the sub-districts became districts. With the formation of the new region, came changes to the Saskatoon badge and the introduction of a number of new district badges.

Changes to the Saskatoon badge included: its name from SASKATOON DISTRICT (S.1) to SASKATOON REGION (S.3); its type from ribbon type to swiss embroidered; and the number of Saskatoon berries on the leaf went from 9 to 10 to represent the 10 parts of the Scout law.

The CREE District badge (C.2) was developed from an original native painting done by Mr. Wuttanee that was commissioned by the first Cree District Commissioner, Mr. Jim Hill. It depicts a Cree Indian wearing a traditional ceremonial headdress of porcupine quills with a single feather.

Initially the Cree badge was worn next to the Saskatoon Region badge, above the left shirt pocket, with the Cree Indian facing the leaf with the Saskatoon berries. As time went on, the Saskatoon Region badge was replaced first by the SASKATOON AREA badge (S.5), and then in 1977 by the NORTH SASKATCHEWAN REGION badge (N.2), at which time the district badges were moved to the right sleeve beneath the group badge. The new uniform of 1991 further moved the North Saskatchewan Region badge below the district badges on the right sleeve.

This year, a new version of the Cree district badge was developed in response to desires to both be more identifiable (with the inclusion of Saskatoon and Scouts Canada) and to better fit on the new uniform between the wider group and region badges. The new CREE SASKATOON badge is composed of a combination of the original Cree badge, The Saskatoon badge (with 10 berries), and the Scouts Canada maple leaf and Scout sign logo. Its colors represent all five Scouting sections (Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Venturers, Rovers) and non-section Scouters. The current version (C.2/1) also includes "1962-1992" to commemorate the district's 30th anniversary. During this year's Guide-Scout Week, it was distributed for all members of Cree District to wear on their uniform, replacing C.2. It is the intention of the district to use the same design, minus the dates, as the district badge (C.2) in future years.

In addition to the extensive trading that went on, there was two major events held during the course of the day. First was a "Loto Badger" (same as the one held in The Canadian Badger Magazine) which was won by Terry Campbell. In spite of some good natured harassment and plaintiff whines of "fixed" I would like to thank all those who entered and contributed to my collection.

The second major event of the day was our "Badge Auction". Through the generous contribution of many Club Members, including Stan Rodgers, John Ochitwa, Dave McKeown, Frank Smith, Chris Guedes and Terry Campbell as well as a non-club member Larry Goldsby, we were able to auction off 55 'lots' of badges raising \$308.05 for the "World Brotherhood Fund".




