From the "Prez".....

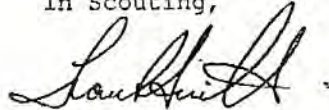

KINGS DISTRICT CAN/NS.K.1. was designed in 1959, by Mr. Geoff Wright, then a uniformed scouter in the district. Each part of the crest represents a different part of the district. The crown - represents the name of the county. The Apple - represents Kings County's main industry. The apple blossom - represents another symbol of the county's largest industry and also the largest festival held each year in the valley. The Book - represents Acadia University which is one of the oldest in Canada and plays a great part in the life of Kings County. The Aircraft - represents CFB Greenwood, Canadas largest air base. The colors of blue with gold trim represent the Bay of Fundy water and the brilliant valley sunsets

Although not in the mainstream of traffic, we were once again a high-light by many participants and staff alike and with the number of application forms that were handed out, I would think we will have a good increase in our membership.

I would like to thank Stan Fleming (C0568) for drafting up the "Eight Steps To Good Badge Swapping For Scouts" that the jamboree committee printed and supplied to each registered unit. This proved very successful from the comments we at the badge display heard and the questions asked, by both scouts and scouters, I hope this will be repeated at CJ'97 as well at all future Provincial Jamborees.

Having the display set up in a semi-trailer unit with the best of lighting, crowd control, weather proof (THANK HEAVENS) and what we thought was the best of security, but still had a few badges stolen from one display board, we also provided some lockup security for some valueable items from other display groups in our module.

My thanks to John Ochitwa for co-chairing this event with me and his contacts for the free use of the trailer, as well as his inside the trailer flood lights. To Ray Crowther, not only as a great staff member, but also for the outside floodlights he provided for the entire module. The other three members, Frank Smith, Rob Leitch and Denis Charbonneau, who were all truly great members of the team and this was another first, in that we had a bi-lingual member that proved it's worth many times.

The number of extinct and older badges that were brought to the display by scouters and scouts alike, in search of a fair and equitable trade and although costly (badge wise), John added several issues to his collection.

Lastly, but not least, was the co-operation from the Jamboree Headquarters Staff, once again they done everything in their power assisting with any and all of our needs.

On the negative side, was the location of the display, in the planning for this jamboree, the committee decided on a pod or module system, which proved to be a poor system in many ways, several displays and ours included, had only one small gateway, almost hidden in the few trees around, with poor signs advertising all of the displays, as a result, some displays and the concession were only open on a part time basis.

As a result of our location, many club members saw fit to set up their swapping material on tables in front of the Trading Post where the traffic was, even though we had 12 tables available in our trading area.

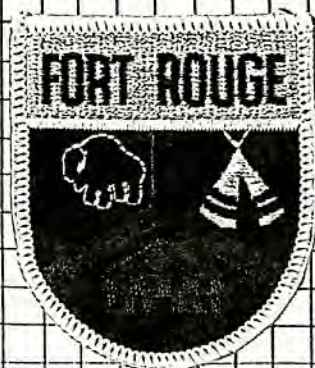
CODE OF ETHICS:

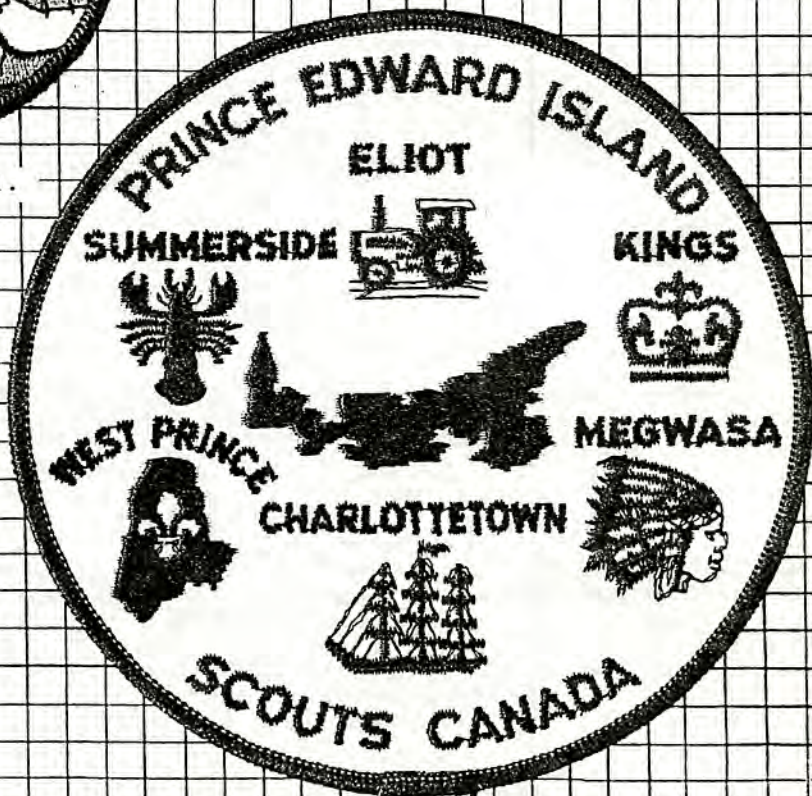

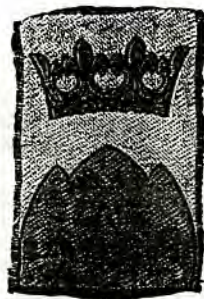

SCOUTING. & BADGES

Since Baden Powell and his ideals for scouting first started, very little has changed since its concept. You can look back in scouting publications of 20, 50 and over 75 years ago and today's ideas are just as fresh as they were then.

However, one thing has changed through various time periods and that is the uniform and its badges. One badge in particular that has succumbed to a multiple number of changes is the "GROUP BADGE". Just about every group has its own particular distinctive badge for identification. Some are plain and simple, going to very ornate and colorful with some having a historical significance to their group.

An early type used (even up to today) is the 1 or 2 line shoulder flash with the groups name and came in a various number of styles of printing (Roman, Old English, Block, etc.). The earlier ones were woven and later ones being printed. See example A & B. Some groups hand-made their own badges, usually in felt and stitching. See example C. Today many groups have their badges made by creast companies who can make the badges as simple or as complicated in colors and designs as each group wants. See example D.
