BYLAWS

- 1.0 The name shall be " The International Badgers Club Canadian Chapter"
- 2.0 The aims of the club:
 - to help foster the Spirit of Scouting
 - to assist with the exchange of information
 - to assist members to start/or improve their collection of scout badges
- 3.0 Membership is open to any member or supporter of any Recognised scout or Guide Association of any country on payment of the required fee.
- .1.Current members will be those who have paid the required fees and will be entitled to vote at the General Meeting.
- 2. Membership paid annually qualifies the member to all benefits of a club member such as Directory of Members, a Handbook of Canadian Badges, option to buy updated Variety Listing of Canadian District, Region & Provincial badges and to receive the quarterly magazine published by the club.
- 3. Annual membership fees are subject to revision at such time as the club runs at a deficit and the fees no longer cover costs. The annual fee will be set by the Executive and will run from September to August. Memberships received after May 31 will apply to the following year.
- 4. A life Member will be any member appointed as such by the Executive on recommendation of the Club members, for outstanding services to the club. A life member will have all the rights and privileges of ordinary membership, but will be exempt from the payment of the annual fee.
- 4.0 CODE OF ETHICS It is a requirement of membership in the Club to abide by the following code.
 - I will apply "The Golden Rule" to all trades and will never knowingly misrepresent an item.
 - I will return all items that do not belong to me.
 - No trade is complete until both parties are satisfied.
 - I will answer all mail as soon as possible.
 - I will not trade if it means disfiguring another's uniform to obtain a badge; addresses should be exchanged instead.
 - I will live up to the Scout Promise and Law.
 - I will not have district, region, area, etc. badges produced for personal gain(either financial or to further my collection). The club is opposed to the production of such badges by other than the appropriate Scouting administrations.
- Any member of the Club who passes fake badges must reveal their sources or be expelled from the Club. If expelled, the member's name and charges will also be passed on to the International Club.
- 2. Any member whose actions, behaviour or activities are deemed to bring discredit or damage to the Club may be dismissed upon the vote of the Executive. The member in question shall be informed in writing of the details of the charges against him. The member in question shall be given sufficient opportunity to reply to the charges levied against him. Notice of final expulsion from the Club shall be final, upon receipt of written notification from the President of the Club.

- 5.0 The Executive will consist of the following: President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor, Cataloguer.
- There shall also be five(5) Regional representatives; B.C., Prairies, Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes.
- .2. The Executive and Resional representatives shall be elected at the general meeting and hold office for a four year term, and shall not be limited to the number of terms.
- 6.0 The following powers will be vested in the Executive.
- To act on behalf of the Club in all matters pertaining to the acquisition and/or disposal of materials or equipment.
- To appoint Executive positions and Regional representatives between general meetings if vacancies occur.
- 3. To appoint Life Members.
- 4. To rule on all matters relating to the Code Of Ethics or any breeches of it.
- 7.0 The duties of the executive shall be
- 1. President- organize and chair general meeting
 - administer the by-laws of the Club
 - maintain contact through the Club newsletter

Vice-president- assume responsibities of President if absence

Secretary/Treasurer- recording of the minutes general meeting

- -receive and disburse all funds for the Club and maintain an orderly accounting of said funds
- maintain the membership lists, renewals, etc.

Editor- accept full responsibity for all aspects of the Club newsletter.

Cataloguer- accept full responsibility of keeping the catalogue current and all aspects of it.

Regional Rep's- correlation of new badge issues and keeping members up to date of badge related regional activities.

- 8.0 The general meeting of the Club will be held once every four years corresponding to and occurring at the Canadian National Scout Jamboree.
 - 1. Notice shall be given to specify the place, the day, and the time of the meeting.
- .2. The President, or in his absence, the Vice president shall preside as chairperson. Meeting shall be conducted as outlined in Robert's Rules of Order. All scouting members are welcome to attend, but only paid club members may vote. In the event of a tie vote, the President shall cast the deciding vote.
- .3. The business of the general meeting shall include:

Election of officers

Membership report

Treasures report

Editors report

Regional representatives report

Old business

New business and input from the floor

.4. a total of 15 members including 2 members of the Executive shall constitute a quorum.

- 9.0 The current Club members shall have the power to alter this set of Bylaws(except clauses 9,10, 12) at the general meeting or an extraordinary meeting. At least 10 weeks prior notice of such a proposed alteration must be given, and the nature of the proposed alteration must be specified in the notice. Such alteration must be approved by at least 2/3 of the members present voting, and, at the request of the Executive, by postal ballot of those members not present.
- 10.0 The assets of the Club, whether income and/or property shall not be given or transferred in any way to any member(s) of the Club, except the payment in good faith as a remuneration to a member of the Club for services rendered to the Club, or for goods supplied to the Club in the ordinary way of business or for any reasonable out of pocket expense properly incurred by members of the Club acting under the authority of the Executive.
- 11.0 An extraordinary meeting may be convened by the Executive at its own requirement or at the request in writing of at least 20 of the present current membership of the Club. The rules pertaining to the general meeting shall apply except that the business of the meeting shall be limited to the agenda issued with the notice of the meeting.
- 12.0 The Club shall not be wound up or dissolved except by the consent of 2/3 of the current membership voting by postal ballet. At least two calender months notice of such a vote must be given. Any and all assets of the Club remaining after full settlement of all just debits and liabilities incurred by the Club, shall be disposed of by transfer to the funds of some other organization or institution having similar aims to the Club and which has in its constitution a clause or paragraph prohibiting the gift or transfer of its assets to any of its members.



WHAT DO THE ABOVE NAMES HAVE IN COMMON ??? ALL ARE (OR MORE CORRECTLY WERE) THE NAMES OF SCOUTING DISTRICTS IN BC. THESE DISTRICTS ALONG WITH AGGASSIZ-HARRISON, ALBERNI VALLEY, CENTRAL CARIBOO, NORTH SURREY DELTA, OKANAGAN BOUNDARY, OMENICA, SIMILKAMEEN VALLEY, SECHELT, AND WHITEHORSE ARE ALL NAMES OF DISTRICTS THAT SHOW UP IN THE BRITISH COLUMBIA PROVINCIAL COUNCIL AND VANCOUVER METROPOLITAN DISTRICT/REGIONAL COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE MID 1950'S AND EARLY 1960'S PERHAPS ONE OR TWO OF THEM HAD DISTRICT BADGES THAT ARE WAITING TO BE DISCOVERED ARROW LAKES BECAME KOOTENAY COLUMBIA DISTRICT AND I KNOW (I WAS IN CUBS AND SCOUTS IN THAT AREA)THAT THEY DID NOT HAVE A DISTRICT BADGE, THERE IS AN"ARROWHEAD DISTRICT" SHOULDER STRIP.FROM THE SAME GENERAL AREA BUT THIS IS A GROUP BADGE WITH DISTRICT NOT REFERRING TO A SCOUT, DISTRICT BUT TO THE GROUP OF SMALL COMMUNITIES KNOWN COLLECTIVELY BY THAT NAME (BEING AT THE HEAD OF THE ARROW LAKES) AGGASSIZ-HARRISON WAS IN THE UPPER FRASER VALLEY AND LATER BECAME PART OF HOPE AND CHILLIWACK DISTRICTS.

.<u>CENTRAL CARIBOO</u> (WHICH HAD ONLY ONE GROUP) I HAVEN'T REALLY FIGURED WERE IT WOULD HAVE BEEN ,LOGIC WOULD ASSUME IT WOULD BE THE AREA AROUND THE PRESENT WILLIAMS LAKE DISTRICT BUT THE REPORTS THAT I'M USING FOR REFERENCE LIST GROUPS AT WILLIAMS LAKE, 100 MILE HOUSE AND LAC LA HACHE AS NOT BEING UNDER DISTRICT COUNCILS.

NORTH SURREY DELTA BECAME (AS THE VANCOUVER AREA SUBURBS GREW) THE PRESENT DAY

TWEEDSMUIR NEAR TWEEDSMUIR PARK IN WEST CENTRAL BC SERVED WHAT WAS LATER NOOLKEOTIN DISTRICT.

SECHELT MERGED WITH MOUNT ELPHINSTONE TO REFORM SUNSHINE COAST WHICH WAS THE DISTRICT COUNCIL NAME PRIOR TO THE FORMATION OF VANCOUVER COAST REGION, A DISTRICT BADGE FOR SECHELT HAS RECENTLY SURFACED AND HAS BEEN REFERRED TO THE CATALOGUE COMMITTEE FOR LISTING (SEE TCB 21/2)

DURING THIS TIME FRAME THE REGIONAL CONCEPT HADN'T TAKEN EFFECT IN BC AND BOTH VANCOUVER AND VICTORIA ARE REFERRED TO AS SINGLE DISTRICTS, IN VANCOUVER WHICH IN THE 50'S WAS KNOWN BY VARIOUS COUNCIL (SEE REFERENCES)NAMES THERE WERE A COUPLE OF AREAS LATER DISTRICTS THAT HAD DIFFERENT NAMES THAN WE NOW KNOW THEM BY NOW SOUTHEAST IS NOW CARLETON AND KITS-FAIRVIEW IS NOW KITSILANO HOW MANY OF THESE DISTRICTS FROM THE PAST HAD A DISTRICT BADGE IS UNKNOWN, BUT THE POSSIBILITY OF THERE BEING OTHER UNDISCOVERED TREASURES OUT THERE MAKES THIS HOBBY ALL THE MORE INTERESTING





ARTICCES OF YORE

An increasingly popular hobby among Scouts is collecting badges — Scout badges, that is. Almost any badges are collected, but the favorite types are the provincial and district badges which Scouts wear on their uniform, and sometimes individual town or city crests.

Other sought-after badges are those from jamborees, especially foreign ones, such as the Seventh Australian Jamboree, or the Na-tional Jamboree held at Valley Forge in the United States.

Scout flag badges from foreign countries are also popular. These badges are given to Scouts to wear on their uniform when they attend jamborees in another country. Collectors in many parts of the world are asking for the maple leaf flag badge, which has replaced the red ensign.

If you're interested in collecting badges, the best way to start is to buy from your Troop Scouter a dozen or so of your provincial and district badges. If the badges are made of silk, they won't cost too much, but the hard-backed crests vary considerably in price. The best possible time to exchange these badges is at a jamboree. Most Scouts at one time or another have the chance to go to a jamboree, particularly a provincial one.

All provincial jamborees see troops attending from the other provinces, and usually one or more troops from the United States; so you have a chance to get badges from all Canadian provinces, as well as from another country. If you're good at bargaining, you should do all right, and perhaps come home with twice as many badges as when you left! But if you're not good at this type of frantic trading - beware!

For more serious collectors, trada, you a handsome effect.

ing badges by mail is another possibility. By exchanging in this way, you can get Scout badges from other countries, especially the Commonwealth nations. Bartering by mail is not at all like the hectic trading that goes on at jamborees. Badges are usually exchanged on a one-for-one basis, and in this way you can get a large number of valuable badges at low cost.

When you've gathered a bunch of badges, you'll probably be faced with the problem of how to display them. One method is to sew the badges on to cloth squares of different colors. Felt is usually a good material to sew them on

Another method is to pin the badges in their proper positions on

CANADA'S COLOURFUL DISTRICT BADGES

Periodically we have published illustrations and stories of District emblems or badges that are worn in various parts of Canada. This month, we begin a new series based on information gathered by Provincial Field Commissioner Denny May of Camrose, Alberta.

Canadian Scouts are proud of their heritage. This is evident in the design of the badges which they have adopted as their own District emblems.

The distinctive uniform identifies a Cub, Scout or Rover as a member of the Scout Brotherhood. The Group shoulder badge and neckerchief indicate the institution or group of citizens who sponsor the Group.

The District badge is symbolic of the kinship that exists between Scouts and the larger community of citizens and institutions in the midst of which the Scouts are living and growing.

This kinship is symbolized on District badges in many interesting ways. Badge designs include devices relating to the geological structure of the land, historical events in the development of the territory, and industrial and commercial enterprises on which so much of the life of the district depends:

A great number of District badges pay tribute to the Indians, generations of whom have provided rich and colourful traditions in the folk lore of Canada.

In creating designs for their badges, several Districts start with a contest open to all boys and leaders in the District. At this stage, the important thing to be found is the idea-symbols and what they mean.

When a "winning idea" is chosen, it can be passed to an artist who will produce an accurate design.

Here are some suggested "rules" for badge designing based on experiences of many Districts.

Keep the general appearance simple. Don't crowd too many symbols into a small area.

Experiment with various colour combinations, keeping in mind that there are definite limitations as to the number of colours that some machines can handle in weaving a hadge. Consult a manufacturing firm.

Be sure to conform to the policy on District badges as laid down by your senior Scout Councils.

In the pages of The Scout Leader we look forward to telling the story of your District badge to all Scouters across Canada and overseas who, in their area, serve with you in training the Cubs, Scouts and Rovers of Canada. *


