Members came from all over; New Zealand, Alberta, USA and from across the province of British Columbia. The addition of more B.C. Yukon varieties helped to fuel the trading, as collectors looked to add these new issues to their collections. New since my last update are the Richmond and North Okanagan. So at this time the newly designed badges from B.C. that are now issued are; Cascadia, Pacific Coast and Fraser Valley Councils. Areas; Burnaby, Coho, Eagle's Rest, Green Timbers, Nicomekl, Pacific Spirit, Orca Coast, Sea to Sky, South Okanagan, North Okanagan, West Kootenay Boundary, West Surdel, Greater Victoria, East Kootenay, Three Rivers and Richmond.

It is expected that the remained of the Area issues from this province will be available by the end of September.

For those of you that collect Proficiency badges (uniform badges) all the new designed Cub Scout, Scout and Venture Scout badges are now in the Scout shops.

Badge Chatter

Greetings from the cataloguer! Once again many club members have brought new issues and new finds to the attention of me and the Regional Badge Representatives. Among those club members I have heard from, directly or indirectly, are Linda Aug, Frank Smith, Glen Wright, John Butters, Steve Kavanagh, John Witham, Denny May, Shem Simmons (welcome to the club, Shem) and Bill Rivers. My apologies to those not personally mentioned here.

In the last column I raised a few specifics for feedback such as the “blue-wave” Dartmouth Central badge. No other blue-wave Dartmouth Central’s have been brought to my attention so until some others do appear we will not list it and instead put that one on the backburner. I did get one jpeg emailed to me of a small Canadian National Jamboree badge purported to be from the 1949 Canadian jamboree (CAN JAM MISC 1/1a) but it was a reproduction, not an original badge from the jamboree. Accordingly, since no real ones have shown up, and they are not in any collections that we are aware of, we are going to delist the badge.

Scouts Canada Re-organization and what it means:

One item that I and the Regional Badge Reps have been discussing is the Scouts Canada move from Provinces, Regions and Districts to Councils and Areas and what to do about this in the Scout Canada component of our catalogue. In consultation with the Club Executive we have decided to avoid the use of multiple listings for badges with the same name (at least where the land mass is the same) and instead under the listing make it clearer whether the badge is part of the old Scouts Canada organization or the new Council and Area organization (an example of this follows below).

Provinces and Councils:

Presently Scouts Canada no longer has a provincial level in its organization but has instead reorganized into 20 Councils (with Areas under the Councils). British Columbia has 3 councils, Alberta has two Councils and Ontario has 8 councils. All other provinces have one Council. So we will be indicating in the *Varieties Catalogue* that BC 1, ALTA 1 and ONT 1 are extinct. Similarly we will do so for Manitoba and Saskatchewan as the provincial badges have been replaced by the one new Council badge in each of those provinces. We will follow suit for the other provinces when their new Council badges are out.

Regions and Councils and Areas: Where Regions were reformed to Councils (or in some cases such as BC G2 - Greater Victoria Region which became an area) we will only have one coding but will clarify within the detail of the coding which badges are region badges, area badges or council badges. See the example below.

Districts and Areas:

While Areas were created in 2002 often the old district badge was used until supplies ran out but now the change to new badges is in full swing. Some area badges have new names (and coding) compared to the district era so there are no coding issues in such situations. In other cases some Areas have retained the old District name (or even Region name in some cases) and it is difficult to determine which era of scouting any one badge represents.

Our *Varieties Catalogue* is the only proper record of the history of uniform badges representing where a scout was/is from and the history has gotten muddled by not coming to terms with how to deal with the implications of the new organization. So, this is now being rectified.

What we are going to do illustrated:

We have decided to use Nova Scotia TRI-COUNTY to illustrate what we will be doing to clarify the District versus the Area era of Scouts Canada. So in the following example a Tri-County badge whether it is a district or area badge will have a T1 coding. As an example, the district era T1c badge will retain a T1c coding. And, an area era badge such as T1f will retain the T1f coding. But the detail of the *Varieties Catalogue* (see below) will make it clear what era the badge was from. By the way, for those district badges that continued to be used when the area was created we have kept the listing as a district badge – if you think we should put a notation in the catalogue stating the badge was also used as an area badge until a new issue came out please let us know.

T.1. TRI-COUNTY

District [CEN]

- A) Ribbon, Rectangular; Triangle is 50mm x 55mm. [WJN-4]
- B) Ribbon, Rectangular; Triangle is 50mm x 63mm. [WJN-4]
- C) Swiss, Rolled edge, Triangular; "BOY SCOUTS TRI-COUNTY DISTRICT", Turquoise background. [CBB,WJN-4]
- D) Swiss, Rolled edge, Triangular; "BOY SCOUTS TRI-COUNTY DISTRICT", Light blue background. [WJN-4]
- E) Swiss, Rolled edge, Triangular; "SCOUTS CANADA TRI-COUNTY DISTRICT". [TCB-18/1]

Area [NS]

- F) Swiss, Rolled edge, Triangular; "TRI-COUNTY SCOUTS CANADA". [TCB-31/2]
- G) Swiss, Rolled edge, Triangular; "SCOUTS CANADA TRI-COUNTY AREA". [TCB-36/1]

So, as you can see above the same basic coding will be used for the District or Area badge when the same name applies. The same will apply to Region and Council badges. This will aid one in actually finding a badge in the *Varieties Catalogue* (and not having to look to see if another badge with the same name occurs further along). At the same time this new approach will clarify which era the badge came from. This is harder to explain than to do so if you just follow the catalogue updates in The Canadian Badger Magazine and new Variety Catalogues as they come out and all should be clear.

Individual Badge Questions:

A new ASC find has turned up which our ASC rep believes should be listed. At this point though I want you to check your collections and swap boxes and let me know if you have one as well vs. the badge being a one-off. The badge in question is ASC C3 Centre Du Quebec. The currently list C3b badge is 75mm x 75mm x80 mm. The new find is 80mm x 82mm x 81mm. The picture below shows clearly how much bigger the new find is. If other badges are out there we will list the badge.



Another badge which I would like feedback on is the BC C17a badge – the Crows Nest District badge with no tail on the crow. Several members have questioned me on whether it is a thread break or not. I have no idea and it is not always possible to tell. I have heard anecdotal information that it is a thread break and that the district is unaware of the no-tail badge. But until there is some definitive information I am reluctant to do anything about this. But, at least one of these badges exists in a collection and so as a start I would appreciate anyone with this badge to let me know they also have it as more badges would lend credit to its authenticity.



Jamboree Badges:

Several of you have probably noted that our *Varieties Catalogue* is inconsistent in the listing of Jamboree subcamp badges. They are listed for recent (and some old) provincial jamborees but the treatment is inconsistent. Similarly, Canadian jamboree subcamps are not listed save for the unusual exception of the last Canadian jamboree (where the jamboree committee was involved in the subcamp badge). I would like to ask you to identify to me via email at ennisgl@telus.net any subcamp badges you are aware of that are not listed in our Catalogue. I will then be in touch to get a scan of the badge or to borrow the badge so that we can treat this section of the catalogue consistently for our members that collect subcamp badges. This is a fairly long-term project so don't expect a lot of changes in sub-camp listings right away.

Once again I would like to thank the club's regional reps: Bill Thow, Anthony Palmer, Everett Dalmas, Tom Evanoff, Dave Winter and Serge Janelle.

CAMP EVERGREEN

NEWFOUNDLAND & LABRADOR JAMBOREE JUNE 29-JULY 3 2012.

CAMP NOR'WES is about a three hour drive west of St. John's and then about ten km off the TCH(Trans-Canada Hwy), located on the shores of beautiful Nor'Wes pond in very close quarters with TERRA NOVA National Park. It is 50 hectares heavily forested with black spruce, tamarack, flowering shrubs and wildflowers, built up on a glacier sand and gravel base. It is complete with all year cabins, mess hall, hospital, headquarters, ration hall/canteen, playing fields, water system, huge generator and two huge sandy beaches. The swimming beach is one-half mile long and the boating beach just a little smaller. The "pond" is quite shallow and one is able to walk way out before water is waist deep, warm and with the sandy bottom, nice on the feet. With the beach less than one hundred yards from my cabin and the water so warm, I passed on the showers and just went for a "swim" at least once every day. What a location!



For the youth at the jamboree, the NFLD provincial council had donated 100's and 100's of badges and pins from previous NFLD jamboree's, Trees, Apple Day's, Pop Corn, group events etc. The BP Guild was pre-filling these into baggies with enough for each youth member to receive 12 badges and 3-4 pins. I was asked if I could continue this packaging and sort of look after the trading area. To most of the youth, badge trading was a new event and to clarify trading rules, before I left St John's, I emailed home and had Joan forward Anthony's CJ-13 "Eight Steps for Good Badge Swapping" to be included in each baggie. Although a jamboree of smaller numbers, badge trading was brisk in the evenings after dinner and participants were eager and tables were full. Interesting enough, very few NFLD district badges were seen for trading but still good trading was had by all!



This was my first visit to the island so I was hoping for a small taste of the island and its people but what I received was a fantastic full course banquet. What a great scenic camp location with excellent facilities, great home-style food but most important fantastic, warm, friendly people. My huge thank you goes out to Chris Pike, camp chief, Jocelyn Meadus, admiration, Lawson Dickson, deputy camp chief, Denise Petten, scout shop manager, the staff cooks, the rest of the camp staff, leaders and youth participants.

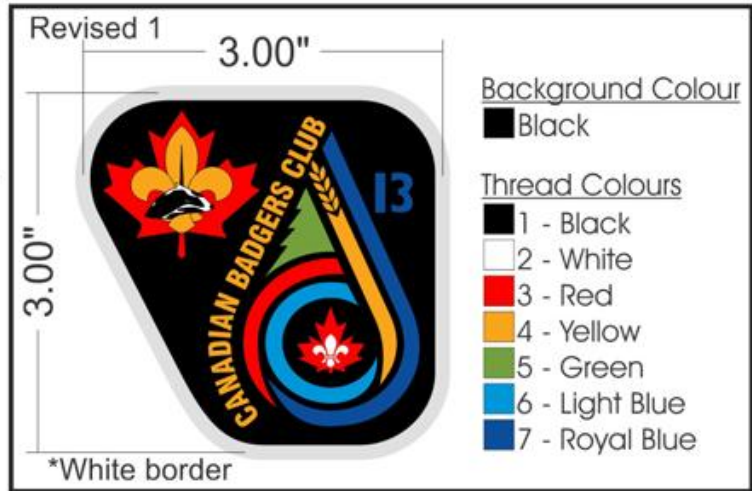

BADGE HISTORIES



CAN/BC K2a EXT KITSILANO

The emblem of the Kitsilano BC district is the Sisiutl (sis-outle). The Sisiutl is a double headed dragon of the Kwakiutl Indian Tribe of BC. The Khatsalahno Tribe, from which the district's name is derived is a branch of the Kwakiutls. The Sisiutl is said to be a good luck omen or a lucky charm. The use of this head on tribal feasting dishes denotes successful hunting and a state of prosperity and well being. It was the Kwakiutl Tribe who carved the Giant totem pole which stands in front of National Headquarters in Ottawa. The Kitsilano District is part of the Vancouver Coast Region.



CAN/BC S5a OKANAGAN SOUTH DISTRICT

The center of the Okanagan South District badge depicts a peach, symbolic of the valley's main industry, with an orchard in the middle and a mountain in the background. The snow-capped peak is known as Apex Mountain; the highest point in the district, and a popular skiing area in the winter. From the peach radiate sun's rays symbolic of the warm weather the area receives. The background represents the lakes which the area's major center Penticton lies between; Okanagan Lake at one end and Skaha Lake at the other.



CAN/NS T1a TRI-COUNTY DISTRICT

In the early 1950's the Tri-County NS district council was formed with representatives from Milford, Shubenacadie, Musquodibit and Maitland while today the movement carries on in more than seven communities. The prefix Tri is used because the Council serves groups in Hants, Halifax and Colchester counties. The shape of the badge and the three trees are symbols of the counties, and also for the large pulp and paper industry. The deer head in the center depicts the

wild life of the area and the well known Shubenacadie Wildlife Park. The river running through the badge represents the rivers which border the counties.
