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

Dear Fellow Badgers,

This issue's cover is of the main gate at Camp Woods, Sylvan Lake, Alberta from August, 1939. It is of the First Alberta Jamboree, which was held August 16 to 23, 1939. I chose to showcase this Jamboree because it was held 75 years ago this past August, at the same site as the 12th Canadian Jamboree was held last year!

The pictures were taken by the Scoutmaster of the 1st Vermilion, Alberta Troop. They attended the Jamboree and these pictures tell their story. The names of those in the pictures have been lost, however the Spirit of Scouting is tough to miss. There are 38 pictures in total which is way too many to print so I have chosen a few of my favourites to put in the magazine. Watch for the Scouts with the Alberta Provincial 1a and 1st Alberta Jamboree badges sewn to their uniforms, as well as the Scouters with the Saskatchewan 1a and the Jamboree badges on their shirts. Is it the 1st Alberta Jamboree or 2nd Saskatchewan Jamboree on the Scouter's shirts? No idea. Both badges had the same design!

On a sombre note, I look at the youth in these pictures and I wonder how many of them were a part of the 1.1 million Canadians who signed up for duty, given that the Second World War would start just two short weeks after these pictures were taken. I also wonder if any of these youth had ties to any Scouts who performed war service just twenty-five years earlier during the First World War; the declaration of which took place 100 years ago this past July.

Since this is the last magazine before Remembrance Day, I wanted to put something in the magazine tying these thoughts together. I struggled for the correct words to reflect my thoughts so I turned to www.veterans.gc.ca and I found this passage on how we remember:

The two minutes of silence provide another significant way of remembering wartime while thinking of peace. Two minutes are scarcely enough time for thought and reflection. As we pause and bow our heads, we remember those brave men and women who courageously volunteered for the cause of freedom and peace.

For those who lived through these wars, remembering means thinking of comrades. It evokes memories of men and women who never returned home. Those born after the wars might picture the youthful soldiers who eagerly joined up from high schools, businesses and farms across the country, only to meet death while fighting against the enemy. They may imagine the anguish of a man leaving a new wife, a young family, an elderly mother. The important thing for all of us to remember is that they fought to preserve a way of life, Canadian values, and the freedom we enjoy today and often take for granted. Remember that the silence is to honour their sacrifice and memory.

Thank You from this Scout to all of you. I will remember them.



The news is exciting across the Prairies this time with the Winnipeg, MB and Regina, SK offices merging in Regina. The possibility exists that Regina will be the Scout Shop for all of the Area badges from those two fine Councils. From Chinook Council, the Lethbridge, Alberta Scout Shop will be closing this fall.

Also in Saskatchewan, the Regina Shop is out of Woody Hills Area badges and there are no plans to make any more. 

Pitt Meadows Day 2014 - City of Pitt Meadows Centennial

This last Saturday (June 7, 2014) was 'Pitt Meadows Day', held each first Saturday in June, with the celebrations including a parade every year.

This year, it is the city of Pitt Meadows' 100th - our centennial, so Pitt Meadows Group designed a special crest for distribution to all Scouts & Guides in our area as well as to the Mayor and council, and the BC Lt. Governor, Her Honour Judith Guichon, pictured here. Her Honour had been invited to the 100th, and was most appreciative and gracious when speaking with both myself and the youth.

Abby Doucette, the girl in foreground, is a Beaver with 1st Laityview Group, (and daughter of the photog, Kate Doucette) and Kyle Genereaux, is a Cub with 1st Pitt Meadows Group. I'd additionally like to thank 1PMG Scouters Sylvia Shang & Trevor Helm, for organizing - & 1LVG Scouters Jose Viveiros, Denise Chandler, Mark Didicher, & Jeff, TRAC Christi Goncalves, DAC Phil Goncalves, & DAC Bruce Wilson for marching with us!

And of course - our fabulous Scouting youth in all sections!

Also present was Yolanda Weinberger - 'ex-Raksha' with PM Pack, visiting from Surrey, Gord Ennis, BC Guildmaster of the Canadian Fellowship of Baden-Powell Guild, and Sandy Kowalski - past scouter in Pitt Meadows who put in almost 20 years of service from Beavers section thru to Council Service team! As this year's parade had a heritage theme, you may notice we had many scouters wearing older vintage uniforms, (witness the Stetson on my head, and the socks with garters), as well as the group flying heritage flags, some of which are 80 years old.

The campfire blanket I am wearing is at least 40 years old, and was donated to 1st PM by Gord Heibein, who had been a Scout Master in Pitt Meadows, retiring in about 1982. We use the 'Gord blanket' as it is now called, for special occasions - investiture ceremonies in the group, camp openings and closings, etc. In this case - the parade. Occasionally, we add important crests to this blanket as an historical repository - the Centennial crest will be one.

Many forget I think, that Scouting and Guiding is not another 'sports team', or local youth organization. Created by parliamentary charter, our purpose is vastly different - service to others, the community, one's family, then to one's self - all the while building leadership skills. We need to remind people of this.

Pitt Meadows Scouts - as were other groups in the lower mainland - were present and active in our community during wars - organizing paper, metal, and other needed material drives - and were actively involved in quite literally saving the community with diking and sand-bagging efforts, during the great flood in 1948.

We take our service to Pitt Meadows very seriously, actively promoting our fair City every chance we get! It was a fun day, and will be well-remembered! Thanks to all who attended - hope to see you next year!

City of Pitt Meadows 100th Anniversary



Congratulations to Rheal Duchesne for being awarded the prestigous Paul McNicoll medal!

On May 24, 2014 Rheal Duchesne received the highly regarded Paul McNicoll medal for exceptional services rendered at the Group, District and Provincial levels. This medal is the highest award a Scouter can receive from the Ontario Federation and the District des Trois-Rives.

Paul McNicoll was a young scout back in 1918 when the first French-Canadian Scout troop was formed in Ottawa and affiliated with the Canadian Boy Scouts Council. As a young Scouter he participated at the 3rd World Jamboree in 1929, where he finally met his idol, Baden-Powell. He was the first and only French-speaking Canadian scout present. He later became Scout Commissioner for the Diocese of Ottawa.

Throughout his scouting career Paul rallied for an equal partnership for the French-speaking scouts at an equal level to that of the Boy Scouts. He was one of the founding fathers of the Franco-Canadian speaking scouts and finally after numerous meeting with the Boy Scouts Council, his hard work paid off and they were accepted as equals with the Federation des Scouts Catholiques de la Province de Quebec in 1948. He didn't stop there as he continued his work for the francophone scouts at all levels. Through his hard work and dedication we are now known as the Association des Scouts du Canada.

After his passing, the Ottawa District along with the Ontario Federation decided to honor his memory with the Paul McNicoll award. It was first introduced in 1985 in the form of a plaque and given out the first time in 1986, again in 1987 and in 1991 this award was changed to a medal. In its twenty nine year history, Rheal is only the 5th recipient to be awarded this medal by the Ontario Federation and the District des Trois-Rives.

July 31, 1909: Edmonton gets first boy scout troop on the prairies

A 10-day camp-out in St. Albert by Archdeacon H.A. Gray's All Saints Boys' Brigade inspired the organization of Edmonton's first "squad" of Baden-Powell Boy Scouts.

Robert Baden-Powell was a major-general in the British Army who founded the Scouting Movement and was first chief scout of the Boy Scouts Association.

The movement initially focused on the union of boys in companies and their training for active warfare in the line of scouting, including practice in camp life, marching, signalling and drills.

By this time, in Great Britain, 25,000 boy scouts belonged to its various branches.

Edmonton organizers believed their group would be the only squad in Western Canada outside of a group recently organized in Vancouver.

The local group expected to be up and running in a few days, the Journal story said, but it

actually took a little longer than that, says John Witham, a member of the Northern Lights Council of Scouts Canada, and a member of the northern Alberta scouting movement's heritage committee.

One of the officers of the Boys' Brigade sent a letter that October to scout headquarters asking for literature and information to help them organize, and the squad was up and running finally in early 1910.

Both the Boys' Brigade and Boy Scouts, as well as the YMCA, sprung up as families began moving from farms to cities, raising a concern that they were no longer learning patriotism and healthy outdoor activities. Such groups, targeted at boys 12 to 18 years of age, often had a strong religious connection.

By the time Baden-Powell visited Edmonton on Aug. 21, 1910, the city had several scout troops. According to the Journal story, more than 100 "citizen soldiers in embryo" including the All-Saints company and a Strathcona troop, lined up in the school room of All Saints' Church where they were reviewed by the chief scout.

The hero of Mafeking, South Africa (the most famous British action in the Second Boer War between October 1899 and May 1900), commended the boys for their work in preparing for the defence of their country and praised the movement's many virtues

"You scouts belong to a very big brotherhood now. Not only Canada, but all over the empire the movement is spreading, and will lead to the making of good citizens, and brave men worthy of the traditions of our race," Baden-Powell told them.

Over time, the scouting movement evolved away from its military leanings, and concentrated on promoting character, outdoor activities, good citizenship and service to others.

It attracted the largest numbers of boys — and girls to the parallel Girl Guides Movement — in the 1960s and early 1970s as Baby Boomers reached the target age.

In 1998, scouting was opened up to girls, who make up almost a third of the 5,000 Edmonton youth who currently belong to 47 active groups.

The 6th Edmonton (1st Strathcona) S couts, based out of Holy Trinity Anglican Church, formed in 1911 and is one of the longest continuous boy scout troops in the country, says Witham. All the other Edmonton troops have closed down at one point and restarted.

Baden-Powell retired from public scouting life in 1937 and lived out his days in Kenya where he died in 1941 at the age of 83.


