Hello members,

For my first message I would like to thank Frank Smith for his many years of dedication leading the club and setting the current course that we are on. I would also like to extend a great big THANK YOU all the members who retired from various positions at the last AGM held at CJ'17.

I would also like to welcome all the new members who signed up and past members who renewed after an absence at the jamboree. You almost doubled our membership. One of the highlights I experienced at the jamboree was seeing not one but two 1955 WJ Prairie sub camp badges in the same small box of badges that was brought to our display area for evaluation.

For those of you that don't know me here is a brief history of my involvement in Scouting and badge collecting. I had two years as a cub 1966 -68. Then my adult involvement began in April 1977 as a Troop Councillor. I then became Troop Scouter a few years later. I eventually moved on to other roles in Scouting; District Commissioner, Area Commissioner, member of the Nova Scotia provincial council service team and several other NS council committees. I moved back to Area Service Team and I am now a member of the 12th Halifax BP Guild.

My introduction to badge trading came at CJ'93 my first jamboree. For many years I was just an accumulator of badges. That changed when, on the 25th Anniversary of our Troop in 2001, I went to a lot of my Troop's former Scouts and Leaders looking for badges and uniforms to put together a display of 25 years of history. Almost none to be had, and the main answer I got when I inquired was "Oh, we threw that stuff out!" That was the beginning of my serious badge collecting. I attended my first swap meet in Montreal in 2002 and joined the club a year later. I have attended the Montreal swap meet (now called the Denis Charbonneau Memorial Swap Meet and Auction) since then.

Along with my Canadian listed badge collection I have a stand alone collection that is one of the most complete of Nova Scotia council, regions, districts and areas. Beyond the listed badges I also collect run differences for the Atlantic area provinces. I also collect Scottish Area Regions and Districts. My original interest in collecting was uniforms and proficiency badges. Those who attended CJ'17 would have seen my 1965 Proficiency Badge Reference Book badge display.

CJ17 CAMP NEDOOAE NOVA SCOTIA

This year's Jamboree site is a Nova Scotia Council camp located about ½ hour drive north of the Halifax airport. A really beautiful spot that was originally a farm, with large grassy areas, heavily forested in sections, and a small lake. The camp has been used for previous provincial jamborees and many other scouting events over the years.

Ian MacCalder headed up the display team and did a fantastic job of organizing the team, club displays, member's displays, club giveaway badge, trading badge and all other aspects of the club participation at the jamboree. A surprise jamboree trading policy was brought down on June 6. It was Ian that brokered the deal that gave us the "Free Trading Zone" around our location. It turned out that this "Free Trading Zone" virtually covered the whole grass area in front of us. Thanks Ian, the club owes you a great deal for the hours and hours and huge amount of effort you put into this event.

Along with Ian, the team consisted of fellow Nova Scotians John Butters, Don Connors, Dave Winters; Ian of course is a Cape Bretoner, Mike Assef and Ursula Page from Ontario, John Witham from Alberta, Gordon Ennis, Linda Aug and I from BC along with Rex Moir from New Zealand and Aram Joukadjian from Australia. A great team.

The hot spot of activity after program hours was St. Andrews Plaza, the camp center, in a large open field. This was where the food vendors, Belleville Museum, Tandy Leather, Zone West, The Canadian Path, Scout Popcorn, WJ19 etc. etc. were located. We occupied one corner of the square and right next to us the jamboree had set up a gigantic marquis for the sole purpose of each sub camp to hold a piazza night. It turned out that this was also included in the "Free Trading Area" which gave us a dry trading place on rainy days and a cool spot on hot days. We could have not asked for a better arrangement.

Friday night and Saturday it rained and it turned most of the surface of Camp Nedooae into a sea of mud and a total quagmire, just as the bulk of the scouts arrived. Our display area inside of the tent, also the pizza tent turned mucky as well. The jamboree put out a call and bought about 1000 bales of hay to help soak up the mud. We located a few loose bales for our area. Picnic tables (or in our case trading tables) were also in short supply but in the end were provided if we went and got them. A rag tag team of scouts jumped in and we soon had our tables.

Don Connors came up with an idea of boosting membership and produced a brilliant coloured sign that offered a "Jamboree Membership Special". This was an internet membership, a club badge and a baggie of badges all for the magical sum of \$10.00. You may ask what was in these baggies. The plan was to use some stuff brought from the donation that the Charbonneau family gave us, a mixture of districts, previous jamboree badges and some left over items from CJ 01 and CJ07. Needless to say, we soon ran out and the team members responded with donations. Mike Assef a huge bag of Trees, Apple Days and assorted badges, John Butters a huge bag of previous CJ and others, Ralph Williams a huge bag of GTR districts, John Witham a huge bag of previous CJ and others. Chris, Gordon, Linda and myself although not prepared with a lot of extras, gleaned items from their bags as well.

Not only did we run out of badges, we ran out of registration forms, baggies and club badges, John Butters who was staying off site printed more forms and bought more baggies, thanks John.

The Canadian Badgers Club display consisted of the clubs old CJ07 vinyl banners but also the clubs new printed in June banners of the new areas. Along with these items Ian brought his personal CJ banners and his 1965 proficiency board. John Witham brought his highest scout award collection 1909 to date.



Don brought his many display boards of Nova Scotia events and his "stand up put your head in the hole and have your picture taken in an old scout uniform board". Chris Green brought along her 1867-1967 badge blanket. I believe Chris is the club's oldest active member and she drove all the way from Prince Rupert, B.C. to attend. Now that is a very long drive.

Badge trading went really well and we heard of no problems with the new rule. Like at CJ13, it was steady all day with evenings, being very, very hectic. It seemed to be just as many as at CJ13, but due to our much better location, more tables and much more space, hard to really know for sure. Multiple part badges seemed to be the really "HOT" item. Next would be sets, pre camp, main badge, and OOS for an example, followed very closely by multiple coloured borders, and then of course ghosts, still popular. The thing to have was the jamboree icon on your badge, in this case a puffin as well as the jamboree logo itself.

The most improved aspect for an OOS had to be staff feeding, unlike previous jamborees we had no huge line ups, HOT food, ample servings (and if you needed a little more no problem), great deserts and no lack of cold drinks except for milk. For lunch you picked up a bag lunch on your way out of breakfast which consisted of a wrap, bun or sandwich, fruit, cookies or bar and potato chips, a little heavy on barbecue flavored perhaps.

The general meeting was held in our display tent, which went well and I want to thank all club members who stood either for re-election or were elected for the first time.

Agenda as presented was accepted

The Prez then welcomed everyone and gave his brief report. A moment of scout silence was held for members Gone Home. Life members were introduced with only John Witham in attendance. Each member stood for introductions.

Minutes of the last meeting were published in the Club magazine and were accepted unanimously. Executive reports were read:

- Vice President Ralph Williams will form an ad hoc committee to set up a chat page on the club website with additional members including Joe Vautour who has experience in such matters
- Cataloguer Gordon Ennis mentioned that since the last meeting there have been 182 new Council or area issues and an additional 40 Jamboree issues. He also mentioned the new issue of the Varieties Catalogue now with star ratings for individual badges.
- The Prez presented Editor Anthony Palmer's report, summarizing all the changes that have occurred during Anthony's tenure. He emphasized that Anthony's efforts have consistently produced a top tier product that has set the bar very high.
- Secretary/Treasurer Don Connors presented the Financial report indicating that the club balance at December 2016 at \$8196.98. Current position at June 30 was \$6,285.70 reflecting costs for the Jamboree and website security. He noted that as of June 30, the club had 125 members. The Financial report was accepted unanimously.

- e) Discuss the changing of our membership term from September- August to January-December


All items were voted on separately and all were passed unanimously.

New Member Help: How to read the badge catalogue (as seen in the varieties catalogue prologue).

Badges are listed in this catalogue according to the International Badgers Club catalogue numbering system. Varieties are designated by a letter: A, B, C, etc. They are listed in the order in which they were issued where possible. The last issue is the last variety listed or the variety marked with {current issue}.

For each variety the type of badge, border and shape is given. For most badges this is enough to identify them. If not, additional information is provided. If the wording on the badge is different from the name, the actual wording is given.

Measurements are given in metric. For circular badges the diameter is given. For other shapes the width and height are given measured across the longest parts of the badge. The width is given first.

The listings also indicate the affiliation of the badge within Scouting's hierarchy. In 2002, with some early exceptions, Scouts Canada transitioned from district badges to area badges (and from provincial badges to council badges) and this hierarchy is indicated in the listings. However, if the new areas kept the district name they usually retained the district badge as their first area badge. For simplicity this catalogue only lists under "Area" the badges produced specifically for the area rather than repeating the last district badge listing.

Badges are listed as EXTINCT (EXT) if the Area / District no longer exist or the badge is no longer used.

Star Ratings

The following is the key to the star ratings:

The star (*) rating alongside any badge is denoted as follows:

None Extinct or current and still available

- * Extinct and reasonably easy to obtain
- ** Extinct and hard to obtain
- *** Extinct and very hard to obtain
- **** Extinct and extremely difficult to obtain
- ***** Extinct and almost impossible to obtain

These star ratings are given as a guide to the rarity of a badge and not the value.

For example, a 5-star extinct listing and a current badge listing:

EXT N.2 NORTH-EAST [W]

***** A) Swiss embroidered on felt, Cut edge, Rectangular, Unnamed; "N", "E" & "'37" in quartered shield. [WJN-2]

NOTE: Split into L.3. & R.1.

North-east district is a 5-start extinct from Manitoba and it's code in the catalogue is CAN/MAN N.2.A. (It was worn in Winnipeg in the 1930's, but the catalogue doesn't include that). This would be considered a one-of-a-kind badge and maybe one or two people have it.

R.4 RATTLER AREA [CR, 6-c]

A) Swiss, Rolled edge, Irregular. [TCB-26/3]

Rattler Area is an Area in Chinook Council (6) in the province of Alberta. The code in the catalogue is CAN/ALTA R.4.A. It is considered a current badge that is very easy to find, and was first featured and listed in The Canadian Badger, Volume 26, Number 3 (TCB-26/3)

Next Page: Your needs list!

We will use my needs list for this part.

The first and foremost thing to remember is your collection is yours. You collect what you want and don't let anybody else tell you otherwise!

I have collected listed badges, focusing on the western provinces because that's where I was born and raised. So, looking at my needs list you will see that it is separated into provinces (like the catalogue) and has the numbered codes with the variety letters after that code. Grab your new Varieties Catalogue and see if you can figure out some of my needs!

BYLAWS OF THE CANADIAN BADGERS CLUB

(Adopted July 2007 amended July 2017)

- 1.0 The official name of the Club shall be "The Canadian Badgers Club."
- 2.0 The aims of the Club are:
 - 2.1 To help foster the spirit of Scouting
 - 2.2 To assist with the exchange of information
 - 2.3 To assist members to start/improve their scout badge collections
 - 2.4 To establish and maintain by our actions a positive image for the club
- 3.0 Membership is open to any person eligible to be a member (pass a PRC and all other required procedures) of any recognized Scout or Guide Association of any country upon payment of the required dues. Employees of Scouts Canada are also eligible for membership.
 - 3.1 Current member shall be those who have paid the required dues and as such shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Club.
 - 3.2 Annual membership dues qualify the member to all benefits of a Club member such as a Directory of Members, the quarterly magazine published by the Club and an updated Variety Listing of Canadian Area, Council, District, Regional & Provincial Badges. A non-digital (paper only) membership will have the option of buying a paper Variety Listing, paying the cost of printing and postage.
 - 3.3 Annual membership dues are subject to revision at such time as the Club runs at a deficit and the dues no longer cover costs. The annual dues shall be set by the Executive and will run from January 1st to December 31st.
 - 3.4 A Life Member shall be any member appointed as such by the Executive or by recommendation of the membership at an officially called general meeting of the Club. Life Membership shall be reserved for recognition of outstanding service to the Club. A Life Member shall have all the rights and privileges of ordinary membership, but shall be exempt from the paying of dues.

4.0 CODE OF ETHICS

4.1 All members must strictly abide by the following Code of Ethics. Any infraction of this Code by any member may result in suspension or permanent expulsion. This decision must be made by the Executive by unanimous agreement. The member in question shall be informed in writing of the details of the charges against him. The member in question shall be given sufficient opportunity to reply to the charges levied against him. The decision of the Executive shall become effective immediately upon notification being given to the member in question by registered mail. The Executive may expel the member in question, suspend him for a time determined by the Executive, dismiss the charges, or reserve judgment until a general or extraordinary meeting of the Club rules on the issue. At a general or extraordinary meeting of the Club, a majority of 75% of the members in attendance is required to reinstate, expel, suspend or otherwise deprive any member of his privileges as a member. After the Executive or the general meeting or the extraordinary meeting has made its decision, the president shall publish its decision with as much detail as he feels is appropriate in the next issue of the Club magazine.

CODE OF ETHICS

- 1. I will apply "The Golden Rule" to all trades and will never knowingly misrepresent an item.
- 2. I will return all items that do not belong to me.
- 3. No trade is complete until both parties are satisfied.
- 4. I will answer all mail as soon as possible.
- 5. I will not trade if it means disfiguring another's uniform to obtain a badge; addresses should be exchanged instead.
- 6. I will live up to the Scout Promise and Law.
- 7. I will not have district, region, area, etc. Badges produced for personal gain either financial or to further my collection. The Club is opposed to the production of such badges by other than the appropriate Scouting administration.
- 4.2 Any member of the Club who passes fake badges must reveal his sources or be expelled from the Club. If expelled, the member's name and the charges shall also be passed on to the International Badger Club.
- 4.3 Any member whose actions, behaviour or activities are deemed to bring discredit or damage to the Club may be expelled by unanimous vote of the Executive as outlined in section 4.0 above.
- 4.4 Any decision of the executive may be appealed by any duly called general or extraordinary meeting of the Club. A majority of 75% of the members in attendance shall be required to appeal any decision of the executive. The member(s) initiating the appeal must notify the editor of the Club magazine and the president in writing of the intended appeal. The president must place the appeal on the agenda of the next general or extraordinary meeting. Notice of the intended

appeal must be published in an issue of the Club magazine mailed at least 30 days prior to any meeting at which the appeal is to be heard. Any penalty that is imposed by the Executive under these bylaws shall remain in effect until an appeal overrules the Executive's decision at a general or extraordinary meeting of the Club. However, any attempt on the part of the president or editor to subvert or delay an appeal shall be considered as grounds to lift the penalty until that appeal is heard.

- 5.0 The Executive shall consist of the following: President, Past President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor, Cataloguer and Internet Webmaster. These officers are to be elected at a general or extraordinary meeting of the Club and may serve for no longer than four years without reelection. There shall be no limit on the number of terms any Executive member may serve.
 - 5.1 These representatives shall be appointed by the Executive and ratified by the next general or extraordinary meeting.
 - 5.2 The duties of these representatives are to act as advisors to the Executive and to be the sole body to decide which badges and variations are to be listed and how they shall be listed.
 - 5.3 The Cataloguer shall act as chair of this group and may be the representative of whichever region in which he normally resides.
 - 5.4 These representatives shall serve until (1) they are no longer active members of the Club, (2) they voluntarily resign, or (3) they are voted out by a 75% majority of the members in attendance at any duly called general or extraordinary meeting of the Club.
 - 5.5 Although not binding upon the executive, it is understood that, in the event of a vacancy on this committee, the advice of the Cataloguer shall be sought and seriously considered.

6.0 EXECUTIVE POWERS

- 6.1 To act on behalf of the Club in all matters pertaining to the acquisition and/or disposal of materials or equipment.
- 6.2 To appoint Executive positions and Regional Representatives between general meetings if such vacancies occur.
- 6.3 To recommend to the general meeting a life membership for any member they deem deserving of that honor.
- 6.4 To rule on all matters relating to the Code of ethics or any breaches of it.
- 6.5 To make whatever decisions and to carry out whatever actions are necessary for the orderly operation of the Club between meetings.
- 6.6 To submit its decisions and actions to the next general meeting for ratification when appropriate.

7.0 EXECUTIVE DUTIES

- 7.1 The President shall organize and chair all meetings of the Club. He shall administer the Bylaws of the Club and maintain contact with its members through the Club magazine.
- 7.2 The Vice President shall assume the duties of the president whenever the president is unable to perform those duties.
- 7.3 The Secretary/Treasurer shall record the minutes of all meetings of the Club and prepare them for publication in the next issue of the Club magazine. He shall keep a record of all minutes and be prepared to produce them at any general meeting of the Club. If the incumbent Secretary/Treasurer is temporarily unable to fulfill his duties, the president must arrange for a Club member to carry out his duties until he is able to resume them. The Secretary/treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds for the Club, maintain an orderly accounting of said funds and provide a full report of the Club's financial status at each general meeting. The secretary/Treasurer shall maintain the membership lists, renewals, etc. As required.
- 7.4 The Editor shall accept full responsibility for all aspects of the Club's magazine
- 7.5 The Cataloguer shall accept full responsibility for keeping the catalogue current and all other aspects of the catalogue. The Cataloguer shall, with the assistance of the regional representatives, examine all potential badges and decide which are to be listed and how they are to be listed. Although any member may question the Cataloguer or any other member of this regarding any badge, the Cataloguer and his committee of regional representatives shall make the

final decision which shall NOT be subject to appeal. The Cataloguer shall communicate regularly with the Editor so that he can keep the membership informed regarding new listing or delisting of badges.

- 7.6 The Past President is an advisory position.
- 7.7 The Internet Webmaster shall assume all aspects of Club business as to do with the Club website.

8.0 MEETINGS OF THE CLUB

- 8.1 A general meeting of the Club must be held once every four years. If possible, this meeting shall occur at the Canadian National Scout Jamboree.
- 8.2 If a period of four should elapse without a Canadian National Jamboree, the president shall designate a nationally significant swap meet as the site of the required general meeting. Unless otherwise decided, the Montreal Swap Meet shall be that site.

- 8.3 Notice shall be published in the Club magazine specifying the place, the day and the time of the general meeting. This issue of the magazine must be mailed at least 30 days prior to the holding of the meeting.
- 8.4 The President, or in his absence the Vice President, shall preside as Chairperson. The meeting shall be conducted as outlined in Robert's Rules of Order. All Scouting members are welcome to attend, but only qualified club members may vote. In the event of a tie vote, the President shall cast the deciding vote.
- 8.5 The business of the meeting shall include:
 - 8.5.1 Election of Officers (At Least Once Every Four Years)
 - 8.5.2 Membership Report
 - 8.5.3 Treasurer's Report
 - 8.5.4 Editor's Report
 - 8.5.5 Regional Representatives' Reports
 - 8.5.6 Old Business
 - 8.5.7 New Business and Input from the Floor
- 8.6 A total of fifteen qualified members including at least two members of the Executive shall constitute a quorum. 8.7 If for any reason, the President should fail to call a General Meeting within four years of his election, the Vice President or any other member of the Executive shall cause a General meeting to convene as early as possible. An election of officers shall be held and, in this case, the President shall be ineligible for reelection.
- 9.0 The current Club members shall have the power to alter this set of bylaws (except 9.0, 10.0 and 12.0) at any general or extraordinary meeting. Written notice must be given to the President at least ten weeks prior to the meeting at which the proposed alteration is to be considered. Any proposed alteration must receive a majority vote of at least 75% of the voting members present in order to be adopted. The Executive shall accept postal ballots from voting members unable to attend.
- 10.0 The assets of the Club, whether income and/or property shall not be given or transferred in any way to any member (s) of the Club, except the payment in good faith as a remuneration to a member of the Club for services rendered to the Club, or for goods supplied to the Club in the ordinary way of business or for any reasonable out of pocket expenses properly incurred by a member(s) of the Club acting under the authority of the Executive.
- 11.0 An extraordinary meeting may be convened by the Executive at its own requirement or at the request in writing of at least 20 voting members of the Club representing at least three of the five regions. The rules pertaining to any general meeting shall apply except that the business of the meeting shall be limited to the agenda issued with the notice of meeting.
- 12.0 The Club shall not be wound up or dissolved except by the consent of 75% of its voting members voting by postal ballot. At least two calendar month notice of such a vote must be given. Any and all assets of the Club remaining after full settlement of all just debts and liabilities incurred by the Club shall be disposed of by transfer to the World Brotherhood of Scouting Fund of Scouts Canada.



Badge Chatter

Greetings from the cataloguer! Once again many club members have brought new issues and information on older badges to the attention of me and the Regional Badge Representatives. I have heard from Serge Janelle, Justin Chenier, Don Conners, John Witham, Robert Bowers, Steve Kavanagh, Will Conners, and Ursula Page. My apologies to those not personally mentioned here.

The big excitement this past quarter was getting to the Canadian Jamboree in Nova Scotia. It was great seeing so many members of the Canadian Badger's Club including two from overseas. It was also amazing to see so many sign up for membership (over 100)! It was a very well run event-badge wise and I had a great time. (Thanks to Ian MacCalder for being such a great team leader.) This issue lists the badges from this jamboree as well as from the 2017 NL Jamboree and ASC Jamboree. Non-listed CJ badges are shown on the Club's website,

https://canadianbadgersclub.com/. Thanks to Steve Kavanagh for putting that together. One thing that was different for CJ is that Scouts Canada had a set of subcamp badges (shown in the listings, but also a set of "Collector" subcamp badges shown below (and not listed).

One badge I wanted to highlight this issue is the Nova Scotia Kings badge. All Kings badges are in an apple shape with the NS K3A (first variety) having a red border, the K3B (second variety) a black border and the third variety also a black border but much smaller. Now we have a new release which is so similar to the K3B issue that we are not going to list it as a separate variety. However, for those looking for minor differences this one is a lighter red background and the blue and green colours in the design are slightly different. The easiest way to tell them apart is

that the new issue (shown on the left, below) has a plastic back while the others have a cloth back (no, the back of the badge is not used for listing but is mentioned as this difference helps distinguish the badges). The K3B listing will indicate it is now the Current issue.





Still within Nova Scotia there is a new Chebucto West Area badge. I have overlain the C9A and C9B issues so you can visually see the longer length of the Area name in the C9A issue vs the C9B issue.

I am still awaiting information on the new NL Labrador Area badge so listing is further delayed. But while we are talking of items from the last *Badge Chatter* I can confirm that the NWT with 2001 on it was a CJ 2001 Contingent Badge and not a NWT listed badge.



The new ASC Sudbury badge S11C on the right is only 58mm from the top of the thin light green border to the bottom vs the S11B which has a wider border and is 62mm deep.



The new ASC Taiga badge (T4B) has different design colours than the B issue which make the badge distinctive.



A new variant of the ASC Estrie badge E2E has shown up which has a lighter blue background and the other colours are lighter as well. These differences are not enough for a new listing but are shown to the left for those that want to hunt the badge down.





Moving to BC there are differences in BC 7 (Pacific Coast Council) that warrant a new listing and the old and new badge (7C and 7D are shown below. One of the changes that jump out is the relative large border on the 7D badge which is the bottom one to the left



The new BC Central Interior Area badge is interesting as the dark and light greens are reversed in the C24C issue compared to the C24B issue. See above images.

The new BC East Vancouver Area badge (BC E8C) has a noticeably longer area name when viewed against the BC E8B issue. See above images.

In Ontario there is a new White Pine Council badge issued. The 9C issue shown on the left is smaller than the 9B issue shown on the right below.



At the Canadian Jamboree there was an interesting set of Canada 150 badges – two for each Council. One all red (a "blood" badge) and one all white (a "ghost" badge). Not really my thing but I show a scan of one of each for my own Council (Fraser Valley Council).



More interesting was a Canada 150 Scouts 110 Badge which if widely available might be listed as a Canada National Miscellaneous badge. At first I thought it was available across Canada but now understand it was only available at the Jamboree. Anyway, an image of it follows:


