Things have been relatively quiet this quarter which is a good thing as I have had an awful case of Bronchitis which has drained my energy for a month now. Because of this and some timing issues some other badges we have been pondering will not have a listing decision until the next issue of *The Canadian Badger*. So, stay tuned!

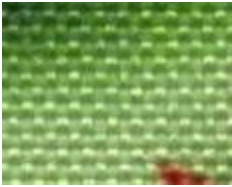
As seems to happen recently we received another new production of a badge (this case River's Edge Area in Alberta) and the name was sufficiently different in length that it gets listed given our published criteria. Below are the "A" and new "B" issues.



You will also note that in this issue of *The Canadian Badger* that we have listed the Canada 150/ Scouts Canada 110 badge as CAN NAT MISC 23A. I had previously discussed this and mentioned we made a decision not to list it as it was only available at the Canadian Jamboree in 2017. As it is now available at Scout Shops throughout Canada it is now listed.

Northern Lights Council has also had a new run of their Council badge ALTA 9. This is one where a listing decision is pending. Both the original badge and the new one are printed but the

new one is via a process called “Sublimation printing”. It is rather interesting as the badge to the naked eye, at a quick glance, looks pretty similar to the original. However, it is clearly a little different in feel and when you take a close look you can see a mottled pattern on the badge.



This portion of the new Northern Lights Council badge shows the mottled pattern discussed above. It is a portion of a scan of the badge showing the green “Northern Lights” and a tiny bit of the red maple leaf (in the bottom right of this portion of the scan). Below is a scan showing the entire new badge (on the top) with the old one underneath.



The last item I want to bring up related to the listings in this issue of *The Canadian Badger* relates to the recently created Alberta areas of Southern Trails East and Southern Trails West. You might come across or hear of a “combined” badge. I show it below but it will not be a listed badge because it is not a uniform badge. Rather it was created as a badge to thank those individuals who have been of assistance to the new areas.



On another front I thought I would show you two versions of BC P1E. The catalogue listing follows:

Swiss, Rolled edge, Shield 54mm x 58mm; Pink salmon, Rounded corners at top of badge, variations in fish & trees. [TCB-14/2]

The listing probably accurately describes the two badges but they are indeed very different. One is a silver fish (variations in fish I guess covers this). The trees are also different (variations in trees covers this). The red border and writing is also different. I have some extras of both if anyone is interested.



Anyway, the Port Coquitlam badge (where I used to live for a while) is one more oddity in my collection that I thought I would bring to the attention of Badgers not from BC!

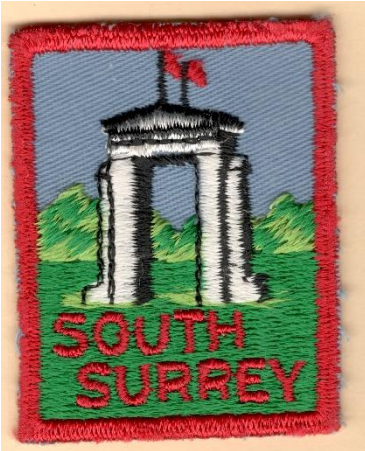

BADGE HISTORIES



British Columbia's South Surrey District, situated near the international border, has chosen the International Peace Arch to appear on its badge. An inscription above the two iron gates inside the walls reads: "May these gates never be closed", a sentiment which is very much a part of the Scout ideal of brotherhood.

We code this badge as BC.S3A



The arrow represents the early history of North Toronto when a Huron Indian Village occupied part of the area, and reminds us of the straight path through life which is part of the duty to God. The 3 flames represent the burning of Montgomery's Tavern during the rebellion of 1837 in North Toronto, and symbolize the 3 parts of the Scout promise. The Mace of the House of Commons represents self-government and authority, and reminds us of our duty to the Queen and our elected government.



The Annapolis District badge was designed in June 1961 by Queen's Scout Dwight Brownell of Middleton. The flowers are apple blossoms, which depict the industry for which the valley area is famous. The cannon represents the historical background of the area, including such attractions as the French Habitation and the British Fort Anne. The diagonal red line depicts the banks of the Annapolis river, which runs the entire length of the District.
