Badge Scavenger Hunt



Another event that I like to do is to promote badge collection and trading with Youth is annual Beaver and Cub Camp in Nova Scotia called Lodges and Lairs.

From the pictures you can see that it happens outdoors and the Youth can have help.

It is a "Badge Scavenger Hunt".

The Youth are given a piece of paper and a pen or pencil and are told to find the badge on the boards to answer the questions.

An example might be, "What colour is the background of the 1997 Apple Day crest," or, "How many Popcorn crest are there on the board," or, "What was the theme of the Operation Alert game in 2005."

All the boards are titled and sealed so nothing can fall out when they get moved around.

This is just a fill-in time activity for the Youth to do when they have finished their afternoon program and they are waiting for their turn for supper. The camp facility cannot feed all 350-450 participants at once.

We have a large fish tank of badges that people have given us over the year just for such times. My instructions to the trader is that I don't care if the Youth wants to trade a blade of grass for a badge or two. Give him or her whatever they are looking for.

Surprisingly, this project started out very small in 1997 but has grown in popularity that now, participants bring area, district and event crests of their own to trade. We have even seen some of those early Beavers at Jamborees trading up a storm.

Take the time to encourage others, especially the Youth, and our hobby will continue to grow and thrive.

Badge Chatter

Greetings from the cataloguer! This issue I have heard from Barry Stuart, Geoff Pinkerton, Don Connors, Terry Campbell, Mike Assef (again and again!), Rod Hill, Steve Kavanagh and also had help from Anthony Palmer, our former editor. I also would like to thank Keith Laing and Dave Frederick for finally helping me complete my quest for CCJ badges!

A large part of the listings are associated with the decision by the Latter Day Saints to leave Scouts Canada and seek another program for their youth. Based upon reports I have read in Alberta this has resulted in a reduction of 2400 scouts from the program. And for us badgers a great many new Extinct listings, both in National and Alberta. Most new Alberta LDS areas were easy to identify with either the LDS name in the area description or a clear LDS symbol on the badge. However, Chief Mountain Deseret caused some head scratching as "Deseret" is an LDS term. However, further investigation clarified that there were both LDS and non-LDS groups in the Area, which, by the way, is located near Cardston Alberta.

This quarter there were several badges that turned up that resulted in listings and also in modifications of existing listings. The issue with the new High Definition BC badges persists with new sizes resulting, not in more listings but less as there are now in-between sizes coming out and so listings were combined. You will see the results in the listings in this issue. In other cases like East Restigouche, Kawaratha, South Okanagan, and Skyline the listing was adjusted. Skyline is an interesting example as shown by the badges below. They look listable and we almost listed them but in fact they are part of a larger set of sizes variations that run one into the other.



A number of other "almost" new finds turned up. If we can confirm other badges are out there they might be listed. One is SASK Selby Regina (S2) with rounded, rather than square, corners. Let us know if you have one with rounded corners.



A real interesting one, maybe because it is mine, is a new "find" Fraser (BC F1) badge. The "A" is shown on the left (below) and the B on the right. In between is quite a professionally made badge that is smaller and has a less inclined name than the listed B issue. I am told by an old scouter from Fraser that it was the second one issued; after the tartan. But it is odd I have never seen any others of these. Does anyone else know anything about it? If so maybe it should be listed but that is for another day based upon

feedback and research.





Another interesting badge I have is the Manitoba provincial badge shown on the left. It is identical to the 1F badge save for the "minor" detail that the background is blue!

ONT Seton (S.29.F) is an interesting one that turned up and did not warrant listing. The two new rectangles are very different in size. But as it turns out the big one (left below) was rejected by Greater Toronto Council and the smaller one (right below) was what was produced for uniform wear. This is now reflected in the listing description, so this important fact is not lost.





Another badge, ONT 8 Voyageur Council turned up with very minor variations. It is 8C with slight differences in the sun, canoe colour and size. Too small to list but those after such differences might want to be on the lookout for it.

Prairie Badge Report

There have been quite a number of changes out here since the last issue of The Badger. All of the Latter Day Saints stake badges are now extinct. According to Wikipedia a "stake is an administrative unit composed of multiple congregations." For many of us this would equate to a parish of multiple churches. This happened on December 31, 2019 when the Church Of Jesus Christ of Latter Saints pulled out of Scouting not just in Canada, but around the world. The list of changes appears elsewhere in the magazine.

A new Selby Regina badge has surfaced. This one with rounded corners and a gold border. If anyone has information on this badge please let us know. Alberta 9 (Northern Lights Council Alberta NWT) has a new badge. This badge is woven rather than printed.

As always, if anyone knows of any new issues on the prairies please let me know.

BADGE HISTORIES

CARELETON DISTRICT EMBLEM

This is the coat of arms of Sir Cuy Carleton, the first Baron of Dorchester. Sir Guy was elevated to the peerage August 21st, 1786, in recognition of his services to the 14th Colony (Canada) during the American wars.

As the first Govenor of Canada, he was instrumental in combining the loyalties of the French and the new colonists, retaining them for the British crown. He quietly avoided implementing many of the stages of the treaty of Quebec and persuaded the British Government to set up a form of government permitting the older inhabitants to retain many of their privileges, rights and customs. The only thing imposed on the French was the British Criminal Law which is the basis of the government of the Commonwealth today. Thus Sir Guy could be said to be the founder of our commonwealth system. His far sightedness retained Canada as a loyal colony for the British crown against the newly declared independent 13 Colonies (U.S.A.).

The coat of arms of Sir Guy Carleton consists of a shield meattered with crosses with a bend of three government arrows desterwise (points to the right). The colours are counter-changed argent (silver) and sable (black). The government arrows signify military service to the Crown. The supporteres of the shield are two Canadian beavers wearing crown-like collars of the rank of Sir Guy. The colours of the beavers is purpure (purple), and their crown-like collars, Or (gold). The beavers stand on Or (gold) compartments to which the motto would be attached. The shield is surrounded by an Or (gold) coronet with four balls. The four balls on the crown indicate Sir Guy's rant, i.e. Baron. The crown is surmounted by a Helm (helmet) and wreath. The Helm (helmet) is argent (silver) and the wreath purpure (purple). The crest surmounting the Helm (helmet) consists of a dexter arm embowed, naked to the elbow, grasping an arrow in bend sinister (sloping and pointing to the left). The arm indicates an industrious person with the arrow indicating a warrior or soldier.

The District uses the coat of arms of Sir Guy (often miscalled crest) without it's motto.

Pure colours have no significance and are up to the individuals choice at the time of designing. Tints on the other hand have a story. All the tinctures used on Sir Guy Carleton's coat of arms are pure.


