In April some of us had a Zoom call and among other things discussed was storage of badges. As one could imagine there were a variety of ideas.

In one of my volunteer positions I volunteer with the Saskatoon Museum of Military Artifacts and we often discuss how to properly store artifacts and we often have many different ideas. We also have many artifacts, from the former administration, that have  
 accession numbers printed on with indelible ink. Ask me how much we like to find and accession number on a World War 1 uniform? Not! In another volunteer position, I'm the archivist for the Saskatchewan Synod and am fortunate to have inherited an archive that was kept up to standards.

Most of us store our collections in binders. Some sew everything to a blanket. One of my Rovers once sewed all the CSP's he traded for at Stoney Creek International to a jean jacket. We were used to American Scouts drooling over our campfire blankets, but he was told outright that he should not have sewn the CSP's to his jacket because they were too valuable. Then again I had some American Scout try to trade for a BP CSP with my CSP's and came back without the badge because, in their words, what the Scout wanted was just too much.

When I started out collecting I mounted each badge on a piece of card stock with tape. Most of us did the same thing. For some of the rarer badges I would put them in a little baggie and mount that to the card. All of that worked great until the pandemic when I decided to remove the tape. The tape had become gummy and was, in some cases hard to take off. You can of course buy archival tape, but as my family will tell you, I'm cheap. Archival tapes are meant to be removed and are extremely low tac and acid free. Not all over the counter tapes are created equal, but any good scrapbooking store will have archival tape.

So how do we store badges? Most of us are familiar with the nine card sports card sheets. These are great for most badges, but not all. Ultrapro<sup>®</sup> makes different sizes, but they can be hard to find. I now just put the badges in the sleeves and should, if I want true archival storage, use acid free card stock. Might not be as easy to move when we find new variations, but it is much more archivally sound.

As Badgers we are all about preserving Scouting history. Sure, we like to get more badges, but those badges tell a story. The story of the District/Area/Region/Province. So take a look at your collection. It is your collection and it, in the end, is up to you to decide how you are going to store and display your badges.

Greetings from the cataloguer! This issue I have heard from George Cartwright, Kim Lanyon, Mike Assef, Frank Smith and Geoff Pinkerton regarding new issues and finds.

You will note that we have delisted one of the recent BC 5 (Cascadia) listings. Interestingly, this was prompted by a new Cascadia turning up. This badge was the same size as the 5C and 5D listings but like the other two had a different length for the Council name. This one was 55mm rather than 61mm for the C and 59 mm for the D. Turns out I have a 57 mm one. It appears to me that the manufacturer is not very accurate on the detail of name length and a whole range of sizes are coming out. So, rather than list a new E and perhaps others I have delisted the D and for C am indicating a range of sizes for the Council name. As you can see from the picture below of the three Cascadia badges look the same and you need the ruler to tell the difference. So, I leave it to you as to whether you want to go after all the different sizes or not!



Ontario, Kirkland Lake has been extinct for some time but the old listing for the B issue ONT K3B notes both vertical or horizontal stitching in the Scout Emblem. This is a pretty significant part of the badge so we have decided to take the jump and list them separately. Yikes I now need K3B with the horizontal stitching! So you can follow easier I show the two badges together.



The other badge that we listed was an old St.Laurent-Cartierville from Quebec (QC S8B). The new find (thanks to eagle eye George Cartwright) is a lighter shade of green and more significantly has a different flame pattern in the design. The flames are vertical throughout whereas the one like it has a horizontal base to the flame portion of the badge before the vertical flames appear. I show both these types so you can better understand the difference.



I had a little fun this past while just looking at some relatively common badges and wouldn't you know it I found some interesting differences. The first I show is ONT C2B. Turns out there is one type with a wide river and one with a narrow river. At least some of the other varieties of Chatham have this difference too.



Another one I turned up was ONT A7A Albion. Take a look at the noses. One has a very dainty nose the other a very Roman nose. Don't worry, I am not listing these but though you would find it interesting. When have you last looked through your common badges?



On maybe a more serious note there are two different size fonts in Calgary C1F. The team has decided that while different a new listing is not warranted.



**Jack was a proud member of Local 46 and worked as a plumber for 41 years before becoming a Plumbing Instructor at Durham College for the last 12 years.**


