


It's time to look at a new visual aid for the Patrol Corner. In particular No. 7 in the 1949 series, the Semaphore Visual Aid Chart introduced in 1957. Let's also explore the literature that will help in mastering this communication art.

"Semaphore is the use of an apparatus to create a visual signal transmitted over distance. A semaphore can be performed with devices including: fire, lights, flags, sunlight, and moving arms." It is a form of scoutcraft.

The Signaller badge for a Wolf Cub was listed in the 1930 Policy, Organization and Rules for Canada. It became extinct in the early 1930's and was replaced. In order for a Wolf Cub to obtain their Second Star they had to "know the alphabet in Morse or Semaphore, and be able to send and read slowly simple words." (Policy, Organization and Rules for Canada, 1934)


The Scout Signaller Proficiency badge was introduced in 1908 and was available until 1968. For a Scout to obtain their Second Class Scout badge they must "know the Semaphore (or Morse) sign for every letter in the alphabet and for the numerals, and be able to send and read a simple message." The badge requirements were to be passed annually. (Policy, Organization and Rules for Canada, 1934)

Charts were published from the early days of the Stores Department history. They were ideal for putting across Scouting techniques. The **1923 Stores Department Price List of uniforms and Equipment Catalogue** lists 32 Scout Charts with number 15 being Semaphore Signalling
Code. These charts were printed on card stock with an



 $8" \times 11\%"$  dimension. They were available until the late 1940's.

The attractive 1949 series was "printed on serviceable cardboard in two colours, ready for hanging." The size of card number 7 – Semaphore Signalling was 10" x 15". The centre piece of the chart is the Semaphore alphabet using flags. Around it are Scouts sending and receiving messages from or to Sea Scouts, along with methods of signalling.





#### **AIDS TO SIGNALLING**

Carl Heddesheimer S.M. 9<sup>th</sup> Winnipeg Troop 1945 *The Junior Leader* magazine 4 part article

"Most of you probably know semaphore. It has the advantage of being easy to learn, requires no apparatus, is quite speedy and is an excellent exercise."

"Its disadvantages are that it can only be sent visually by daylight, and only over comparative short distances. But for

casual hikes, camping trips, etc., it is probably the most convenient code of all."<sup>5</sup>

Bulk of the article pertains to Morse Code but it stresses these hints to remember:

- practice makes perfect
- watch your angles
- watch your stand
- always make two sets of flags
- choose your background wisely
- · control your speed

Your Semaphore Flags

Semaphore Flags can be easily and cheaply made, or you may secure them from the Stores Dept. The recommended size is about 18 inches square, and the stick should be about 2 feet 6 inches long. Actually the length of the stick should be governed by the height of the Scout and should not be so long that when it is moved from the ready position, it will prove troublesome by striking the ground. Two sets of flags should be made, a white set for use in front of dark backgrounds and a dark set for use in front of light backgrounds.

# HOW TO TEACH SECOND STAR SIGNALLING

#### 2 STAR CUB SIGNALLING TEST REQUIREMENTS

REQUIREMENTS

Cubmasters should make a point in teaching 2nd Star Signalling not to encroach upon the signalling test for a Second Class Scout. The 2nd Star requirements as provided by P.O.R. are: "Know the alphabet in Morse or Semaphore, and be able to send and read slowly simple words."

One final note on the Signaller Badge...<sup>6</sup>

There is, of course, a bit more to the badge than just this. You must learn the different formation signals as used in your troop (ask your Scoutmaster to let you take charge of the troop for these once in a while), and also know the various signals described in Scouting for Boys, Chapter 7. It sounds like an awful lot, and I know many of you will get fed up, but stick to it and you will come out on top, and you will have accomplished something.

In closing, the Scouts Canada National Museum continues to promote an interest in communications through its Amateur Radio station with call sign VE3SHQ. It began back in the 1960's when it was operated by the National HQ Radio Rover Crew. Today it is operated by a group of adult Scouters, who also run courses for Ottawa-area Youth & Scouters leading to licensing as Government approved shortwave radio operators. Advance courses provide Morse Code training.



# **Badger Gord's**

Greetings from the cataloguer! A very sad first; after more than a dozen years as cataloguer this is the first issue with no new listings or even new finds from the past!

There are a few things I want to show you that might be of interest, related to old provincial issues. One is the PEI provincial ribbon badge; PEI 1.E.. Above or below the badge proper, so not related to listing, are ones that say Cash's others say J. + J. Cash Inc. and still others that do not have the manufactures mark. Also, although I don't think I have it there are ones with a slightly smaller inside shield – but too small a difference to list. Anyway, for those that like odd variants added to their collection now you know what to look for!



The BC provincial ribbon badge (BC 1.B.) has a similar range of marks. Some say Cash's while others say J + J Cash Inc. while others again say nothing about the manufacturer. And, once again I am showing my wonky ribbon from B.C. The middle dark one is difficult to read owing to the fold but does have the J + J variant. Interestingly the light one also says J + J ... on the other side of the fold line. Again, some badges for specialist collectors to be on the lookout for.









I now know of two round Council badges. The Northern Ontario one shown in a previous Badge Chatter and now one from Nova Scotia (see below). These appear to be for service scouters but not sure they are well controlled – even I have one! But I have a question for you. Does anyone know of other Councils that have created a similar badge? I look forward to any information you can supply.



#### "FROSTIE" AWARD



Frostie was the brain-child of Scouter **Bill Stanbrook** who created the "Frostie Award" system when he felt that a group of his Scouts, who had camped out when the temperature was well under the 0 degree mark, deserved some form of recognition.

The award certificate is now presented to a Scout or Scouter who has "slept in his own fabricated dwelling for a night, when the temperature or wind chill factor was 0 degrees Celsius or lower.

The first time the award is presented, it is called "First Degree of Frostie." The next time will be the "Second" and so on. Some Dartmouth Scouts have up to 20 degrees of Frostie.

I am told when Frostie sometimes appears in person to present the awards he receives a 'warm' reception from his campers. He has also appeared at winter carnivals, parades, campfires and during Scout-Guide Week events. In 1975, he joined Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and Goofy on the Scout float which appeared in the Dartmouth Winter Carnival Parade.

The popularity of Frostie has now spread across Nova Scotia and also into southern Ontario.




