Second. To help other people at all times.

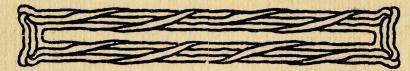

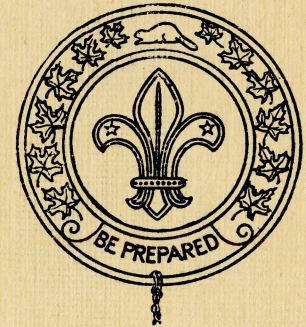
The Scout Law

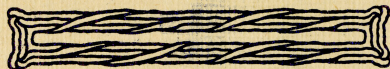
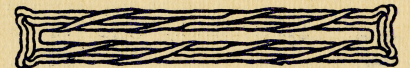
